Seventh

The Board of Directors may make by-laws and from time to time may alter, amend or repeal any by-laws, but any by-laws made by the Board of Directors may be altered or repealed by vote of two-thirds in interest of the stockholders entitled to vote at any annual or special meeting, provided notice of such proposed alteration or repeal be included in the notice of such meeting.
