Thirteen cars of piping and other material will arrive in a few days.

District Attorney Bembly was in Raton the first of the week to attend the preliminary hearing of the horse thieves who were caught in possession of a saddle and several head of horses belonging to Capt. French. The horses were stolen last week by L. Perdie and Jose Flores and another Mexican, John Friend, foreman of the French farm, and Fred Lambert, constable of this precinct, started on the trail of the thieves about three o'clock in the morning and rode to Colfax where they secured an automobile and followed them to Trinidad reaching that place a few hours behind the horse rustlers. They were arrested while trying to dispose of the horses and brought to Raton where they plead guilty at the preliminary and were remanded to jail.

Pablo Herrera was loading a .22 rifle and in some manner it was discharged and killed H. Truyillo entering one side of the nose and coming out on top of his head killing him instantly. The body was shipped to Las Vegas Monday for burial.

COMPLETE VICTORY FOR THE WETS
Two to One is Majority Against Prohibition Candidates for Justice of the Peace in Roswell.

Roswell, N. M., Jan. 15.—The election of justice of the peace in the two precincts of Roswell Monday was the hottest in the history of the town except the prohibition election last April. It was up to the prohibitionists yesterday to elect a justice in favor of prohibition, for, under the law, one of them must be appointed police judge, and the police judge has the enforcement of the prohibition ordinance. They failed to elect in either precinct, the "wets" electing M. W. Witt over A. J. Welter, the present justice, in Precinct No. 1, by thirty-seven majority and re-electing R. D. Bell as sworn "wet," over D. P. Greiner, who was hoisted by the "dries." In the second precinct, the "wets" won by more than two to one. The first precinct was supposed to be "dry," but it extends twenty miles north and a bunch of thirty-six men who came in one lot from the Acme cement mill, fourteen miles north, carried the day for the "wets."

In the first precinct L. P. Rucker defeated David Martin and Bevy C. Hughes for constable and in the second Fred Behringer was re-elected constable over A. A. Chavez. It was a complete "wet" victory.
