

NO SALARY BILL.

As is well known to our readers
there was no salary bill passed at
the last legislature and the county
officials as well as some other officials
have been getting only part
of their pay under the former statutes.
The salary bill early came
up in the present session of the
legislature and a bill was drafted
by a joint committee. Several other
bills providing for salaries were
introduced by various members of
the two houses. The committee
bill was introduced and passed by
both houses about two weeks ago
and was vetoed by the governor, who
sent a message to the legislature,
the general import being that the
salaries named were too high. It
failed to pass over his veto in the
house, that body lacking about
three votes. The bill was amended
in a slight particular and again
passed both houses, was vetoed by
the governor for the same reasons
and again failed of passage over his
veto.

At the present time it seems that
there will not be any salary meas-
ure passed which will indeed be
unfortunate, although it is possible
a more of a get together spirit may
manifest itself during the closing
hours of the legislature.

The wrangle over the salary bill
and the ill feeling it has engendered
has proved an obstacle to the
passing and repealing of bills that
were of paramount importance. Public
opinion naturally is divided in
criticism of the shortcomings of the
present legislature, and which ever
way the trend lies will doubtless.

A few members of either house
went to Santa Fe with the intention
of doing some good for the people
and the delusion has been held by
many that the common tax-payer
was to come into his own. If he
has it will be through some meas-
ures that must be crowded through
during the closing hours when the
members cannot give the study that
they should have, all of which is
quite unlikely.

**PROGRESS OF THE FRIEDMANN

The cure for tuberculosis recently
announced by the Berlin physi-
cian, Dr. Friedmann, still occu-
pies a great deal of attention from
the press. The now distinguished
German physician arrived in New
York about two weeks ago and the
first administration of his serum
was made soon after. Quantities of
the serum have been turned over
to the Government physicians and
several clinics were held under the
Doctor's direction. He is now in
Canada and will return to the United
States in a short time.

There seems to be a more favor-
able opinion of the doctor than
possibly there was at first, while
the physicians are becoming more
of a unanimous mind to let time
tell the tale of success or failure.
There are thousands of sufferers
from the great white plague who
are hoping that the cure is not
the regulation fake which has mock-
ed them from time immemorial.
Two hundred consumptives have
journeyed from New Mexico alone
back to New York with the hope
that they could even get the treat-
ment. With tests that are being
made it will not be long before the
merits will be fully known to all
as to whether it is a cure, a partial
cure, merely an immunizing
agent under certain conditions or a
rank fake and until that time all
can appreciate be fair and impar-
tial.
