The new El Paso firm, Jarrell, Ballard & Co., will be successful. The firm has the necessary capital, and it knows how to advertise. That is all that is necessary in this age of push and enterprise. Their store closed its doors on its opening day for an hour and a half in order to give the clerks an opportunity to wait on customers. This fact speaks volumes for the business sagacity and advertising ability of the manager. A dozen new firms have started in El Paso since the first of the year but on their opening days the proprietors did not close the doors because of a rush of business. The doors were closed early because of lack of business.

The News predicts that every special sale day of Jarrell, Ballard & Co., will find an immense crowd of patrons wending their way toward the store. It predicts that less enterprising firms will also find business rushing past their doors. One firm like Jarrell, Ballard & Co., will do more to liven the commercial side of El Paso's business affairs than fifty tight-wad, mossback concerns which start in with the same capital. El Paso newspapers should give Jarrell, Ballard & Co., the "glad hand," for the firm will teach other merchants an object lesson which will be of incalculable benefit to the newspapers.

GOVERNOR STRENSBERG, of Idaho, was a witness before the Military Affairs committee for twelve days, giving testimony as to the mining riots that occurred there last year. Any impartial person who heard his testimony must feel disgusted with the Democratic efforts to place upon the shoulders of this administration the responsibility for the murders, arson and other crimes that were committed there. The governor denied every charge made in the resolution, offered in the house by Representative Leutz, of Ohio, as a result of which the investigation was ordered. He denied that the prisoners were held "under the most brutal and tyrannical conditions." He denied that "the bull pen" was unfit for human habitation. He denied that the treatment of the prisoners was "brutal and degrading." He denied that a dying prisoner's request for a priest had been refused, a charge that had been made by the San Francisco Examiner, and which had been investigated and found false, at the instigation of a very high official of the Catholic church. He also denied that an escaping prisoner had been shot and killed by the soldiers. As a matter of fact, there is no political capital to be made out of the affair by the Democrats, and well organized labor will fall to sustain the actions of the band of disorganized labor that spread fire and murder through Shoshone county.

Farmers in Oregon have had the same experience with their flocks of sheep as resulted elsewhere through the Democratic slaughter of the protective tariff. Sheep were worth almost \$6,000,000 to Oregon farmers in 1893, having increased in value from \$2.12 in 1891, up to \$2.40 a head in 1893.

But then came the policy of destruction by the Democratic administration. Sheep that were worth \$2.40 cents each just before the inauguration of President Cleveland were only worth \$1.16 two years later—a drop of more than 50 per cent.

Better times came in 1896 when president McKinley was elected, with a Republican senate and house of representatives. The sheep of Oregon began to pick up a little. In 1898 they were worth \$1.66 each. In 1899 they were worth \$2.49, more even than in 1893. At the beginning of this year they were worth \$2.67 each. This was an increase of more than 125 per cent within five years, and it was the highest average price ever touched in Oregon. Compare the following figures:

The days of six-million-dollar sheep returned to Oregon last year, while now

the flocks in that state are worth near seven millions. There has been a gain of \$3,600,000 to the sheep owners of Oregon since 1893. That represents the cash value of protection for wool as against free trade in wool.

Bryan said in congress: "I am for free wool." So say all Democratic senators and congressmen. But the Oregon farmers want protection and will elect only Republicans.
