### REPUBLICAN PLATFORM.

The following is the text of the platform and the resolutions adopted by the Republican territorial convention at Socorro, N. M., on the 17th day of March, 1900, reaffirming its faith and allegiance to the declaration of principles set forth in the national Republican platform of 1896.

1. That we pledge ourselves, and the party in New Mexico, to the hearty support of the platform to be adopted in Philadelphia, to protection, sound money and expansion, and to the nominee of that convention, whom we believe will, and of right should be, that honored, tried, true and able statesman, American citizenship, William McKinley.

2. That we admire and reverence the wise and patriotic administration by President McKinley, of public affairs in war and in peace, at home and abroad, and that particularly this territory is grateful to him and the principle he represents, for the splendid prosperity we have enjoyed during the three years of his administration; that we are grateful to the president for appointing as governor a native of this territory, the first in our history under the American government, and we most heartily endorse the administration of Governor Otero as having been economical, conservative and prudent and for the best interests of New Mexico here and in the east.

3. That we particularly commend in Governor Otero his zeal and energy in organizing the troops for Mexico in the war with Spain, by which he enabled New Mexico to furnish more than her quota of soldiers in less time than was required, and in that splendid American regiment called the "Rough Riders" to gain for our territory undying fame, and for his coolness and valorous conduct in the different sections of the territory, made to the secretary of the interior, and through him to the president, congress and the citizens of the United States, which have done so much to bring our great natural advantages before the people of the country. We believe that the salary paid to the governor and justices of the supreme court to be altogether inadequate. Therefore, we earnestly pray that the bill now before congress for an increase in the salary of those officers be enacted into law.

4. That this convention strongly commends the measure introduced into the United States senate by Chauncey M. Depew, of New York, a bill entitled "An act to promote and encourage the mining, mineral and metallurgical industries of the United States," and that our delegates in congress be instructed to use all honorable means to the passage of the same.

5. We heartily approve the action of congress in its refusal to pass laws pending before it under which it was proposed to lease the public domain in the territory of New Mexico, and thereby deprive our citizens of the privilege of pasturing and grazing their flocks and herds thereon.

6. That, whereas there are many just and meritorious claims pending on account of the Indian depredations, for the adjudication and payment of which no adequate provision has yet been made, we respectfully call the attention of congress thereto, and earnestly request such legislation as will lead to a prompt consideration and payment of all such claims.

7. We renew our demand for the speedy admission of our territory into the sisterhood of states as an inherent right by virtue of our population, resources, our past and present patriotism, and our constant loyalty to the flag of the union and solemn treaty obligations.

8. And be it resolved that this convention voices the Republican party of our territory in an appeal to the members of the house of representatives to defeat the bill recently reported favorably by the committee on territories of the said house of representatives disapproving the act of the legislative assembly of New Mexico, entitled "An act to create McKinley county," in chapter 19 of the session laws of 1899. That in this proposed legislation we perceive an attempted interference with the right of local self government, which should properly be submitted to the territorial legislative assembly for appropriate legislation thereon, and a covetous design by interested persons to now defeat an act of the assembly which those same persons at the time of its passage advocated, and that we hereby disapprove and distinctly condemn the policy pursued in the attempted passage of the measure by congress.

9. Resolved, That the Hon. Solomon Luna, our present able and efficient member of the Republican national committee, be and he is hereby unanimously endorsed for that position for the ensuing term upon such committee, with our sincere thanks and appreciation for his valuable services thereon in the past.

ON THE 24 of April, 1900, close upon 1,000 free rural postal deliveries were established, some of them serving as many twelve or fifteen hundred people daily, the average being 750 persons a route. Not one state which had asked for the service has been left unrepresented. The good work is still going on. Nothing short of a revolution can now check it.

CHAPELAIN CHARLES C. PIERCE, of the United States Army, in a report to the adjutant general on the liquor question in the Philippines, says: "I am forced to give my testimony that the substitution of regimental canteens, in which only beer was sold, in the place of traffic in native gin, resulted in a most immediate and perceptible improvement in the sobriety of the troops."

IF THE hard times that the country suffered during the former administration were not on account of, but in spite of, Democratic effort to prevent them, and the present prosperity is due not only to Republican efforts to bring it about, but in spite of the same, the only safe thing for the lover of prosperity to do is to endeavor to keep that party in power whose founders made good times.

The Manila correspondent of a Paris paper, "Le Temps," wrote that if the Filipinos "did not expect help from the Democrats the killing of American citizens and the expenses of the war would end at once." Every human being who wishes to see our soldiers defeated is opposed to McKinley. It is singular indeed what sympathy the Democratic party inspires among the enemies of our country.

### How to Retard Peach Blossoms.

Probably the factor operating to cause the total loss of our peach crops in the seasons when they make a total failure is the affection of the fruit by late frosts. Consequently it is always desirable to have the trees to bloom as late in the season as possible. Many methods have been sought by which this end could be obtained. "Smudging" as a preventative process is well known, and has been attended with great success, but probably the most effective means has been found to be whitewashing. It is well known that the two colors which absorb heat most readily are black and purple and that white has been found to be the best reflector. Owing to the fact that the bearing twigs of the peach are nearly always of a dark purple color it has been found that they very readily absorb the heat rays of the sun in the late winter or early spring, and that such absorption causes the fruit buds to swell prematurely,—thereby exposing them to great danger in case of late frost. If, however, the purple color was replaced by a white surface, the sun's rays would necessarily be more or less reflected, and careful experiments with the thermometer made at the Missouri station during the past few years have proved that a considerable variation in temperature is observable between whitewashed and unwhitewashed peach twigs. This subject has been thoroughly investigated at the Missouri station, and it has been found that a coat of whitewash applied to the trees in early winter by means of a spray pump and renewed as often as washing rains or other removing agencies render it necessary, has proved absolutely effective in retarding the development of the fruit buds, while untreated trees bloomed from a week to ten days sooner and were in several instances injured by late frosts through which the whitewashed trees passed unharmed. Consequently this method of treatment can be quite confidently recommended.—Ex.
