Five new patients for the U. S. merchant marine hospital at Fort Stanton, passed through Alamogordo Saturday.

Bert Rowland has been appointed postmaster at Captain, Lincoln county, and will take charge shortly when the name of the office will be changed from Gray to Captain.

The Caballero Onyx company of Otero county, last week filed incorporation papers in the office of the territorial secretary. The incorporators are Chas. W. Alexander of Alamogordo; H. E. Runkle and Lew Gilbert of El Paso. The capital is \$350,000 and the headquarters of the company will be at El Paso. The New Mexico office of the company will be at Caballero Canyon, Otero county.

W. J. Burger brought into the Democrat office one day this week, some very fine apples, grown on McGee's ranch, Upper Penasco, near the mouth of James canon. They are of the Wolf River and Belle Fleur variety; the specimens will weigh a pound each. The tree bearing the fruit came from Stark's Missouri nursery and W. J. The rich gold vein being developed on the Comdromis mine, near White Oaks is proving to be a genuine Klondyke as far as it has been opened. Nuggets of pure yellow gold as well as rich quartz, dilleged with the yellow metal in large quantities were brought to the surface last week. This property is soon to be taken in charge by Kansas City capital and it is expected that extensive operations will be commenced thereon immediately afterward. This will be another feather in the cap of White Oaks as a gold producing camp.

According to Col. Knaebel's figures the territory contains 78,364,160 acres, of which 5,000,000 acres has been given outright to the territory and cannot be sold for less than \$3 per acre. In addition some 3,804,160 acres may be leased for not less than 2 cents an acre. If all the latter be rented at the minimum rate the territory will have an income therefrom of \$76,000 per year. This will help to make the financial standing of the territory even more sure than it is at present and should be an inducement for outside capital to invest in the territory.

Citizens and Railroad Company Subscribe Liberally.

A mass meeting of the citizens of Alamogordo was held in the Improvement Company's office, Wednesday evening, Oct. 10, for the purpose of raising money to sink an artesian well. The meeting was called to order by W. H. Slaughter, and on motion Robt. White was elected chairman and W. E. Warren, secretary.

George Carl stated that he would advance \$500.00 and furnish steam power free for operating drill. Also if flowing water be found at five hundred feet, or at any depth will assume the expense of first five hundred feet, and if money raised by citizens and railroad company be not all expended will refund balance on hand pro rata as per donation.

Mr. Greig stated that the railroad company or Mr. Eddy would advance like amount of money raised by citizens. Motion made and carried that a committee of three be appointed to raise money by subscription and that these three be George Carl, representing his interest, A. S. Greig, representing the railroad company, and R. H. Pierce representing citizens.

NEW MEXICO LEAD COMPANY

Will Soon Have Its Concentrator Ready For Work.

C. B. Boggiano, secretary of the New Mexican Lead company, has returned from the company's property in the San Andreas mountains and is enthused by the state of affairs there. He says all buildings connected with the mines are complete except that in which the machinery is to be placed and it will be completed by next Wednesday.

Mr. Boggiano says that the machinery will be running within five weeks and Mr. Johnson, the man from Joplin, Mo., who is superintending the work, has all engineers, firemen and other hands necessary already there to run the mill when it is ready to start.

Twenty miners are at work in the mine and they are easily domiciled in neat homes furnished by the company. A steam drill will be started next Wednesday the power to run it being already there. The wood haulers have 300 cars of wood on the ground ready to be used as fuel in running the mill and they are still hauling.

Mr. Boggiano is here now buying supplies for the company's store at the mines.—El Paso Herald.

About three hundred pupils are enrolled in the public schools of Las Cruces.

The new road from Pina to Media Dia canon, in the Cochiti district, has been completed.

The half-day system for the primary school was put into effect at Albuquerque recently.

Ground was broken yesterday in front of the capitol building in Santa Fe for the proposed new street railway.

It is the fad in Deming at school for the girls to play marbles, and some of them can play as well as boys.

George L. Smith, Henry Brown, Will Stern, Hank Ritter and E. L. Sells of Bland killed six bears during a recent hunt.

Jose Salinas committed suicide at Las Cruces by shooting himself with a revolver. No cause can be assigned for the man's deed.

The hoboes are getting pretty numerous at Albuquerque and they will be put on the street gang and worked as hard as possible—a new experience.

The total enrollment in the Santa Fe public school is 696, and the average attendance forty, both being superior to the same at this time last year.

Sil Gamblin, of Silver City, arrived at Albuquerque from Cape Nome, not much richer than when he left, but considerably wiser as to the resources of Alaska.

Coal Mine Inspector Jo E. Sheridan has tendered his resignation as a member of the board of regents of the Silver City normal school and it has been accepted.

Sheriff Blair left Silver City for Santa Fe having in charge ten prisoners for incarceration in the Territorial penitentiary, the result of the recent term of district court.

I. B. Hanna, superintendent of forest reserves in New Mexico and Arizona, has returned from a trip to northern Arizona where he went over the ground of a proposed forest reserve.
