few supplies to start out with if such are needed.

During the past fire season a Ranger was put in charge of the area added to the Forest from the Mescalero Indian Reservation. For fire guards, Mescalero-Apache Indians were employed and they gave entire satisfaction. Although not a single fire occurred in that region, the ranger and the fire guards were over on the watch and ready at all times to start at the first detection of smoke.

For the past season our fire plan accompanied by a map of the entire Forest showing the location of the telephone lines, important ranches, tool caches, important streams, springs, etc., were sent each Forest officer.

For the ensuing season this plan will be revised, much new data will be added to the maps, and although it can not be perfect it is improved in so far as possible before the beginning of the ensuing fire season.

Although Forest officers are on the aggressive much of their time, during the fire season it is a matter of defense. It is with the end in view, therefore, in the following up of our defense that no stone be left unturned that will enable the administration of the National Forest to make the protection against fire more effective.

The fire season calls for every Forest officer to be ready at all times to the exceptional judgment and nerve to do the hardest kind of manual labor, to undergo a severe mental test and further to be ready at all times to endure the greatest hardships.
