SANTA FE READY FOR CONVENTION

Santa Fe, N. M.

The first state convention of the Democratic party convening at Santa Fe on October 3, will be a historic event, to which those who come to the Capital on that occasion will refer very often during after life.

Men of national prominence will be present to make addresses, among them Speaker Champ Clark, of the House of Representatives, and Ex-Governor Joseph W. Folk, of Missouri, both of them presidential possibilities.

The interest of a visit to the Capital always of charm on account of its being the seat of government and being situated amidst surroundings of scenic beauty and magnificence, and being a point of historic and prehistoric interest with many public buildings and church institutions, will be further enhanced by decorations that the entertainment committee has decided upon. An arch of electric lights will welcome the visitors; flags and bunting will form tasteful decorations on the main street and in the House of Representatives, in which the convention will meet and in which stirring scenes will follow each other in one climax after another, will be more handsomely decorated than at any time before in its history.

Band concerts and social gatherings will be the order of the day. A thousand visitors are expected from the outside, the low railroad rates, the historic occasion, the interesting events that will transpire, will draw many who are not politicians, but the politicians will be there in force, and the Democratic leader who is not present will be rare.

All the committees in charge of the entertainment of the visitors are working hard. Republican is joining with Democrat, and Prohibitionist with Socialist, to make the convention a noteworthy one and to demonstrate the hospitality of the Capital City. The executive committee consists of the mayor, Arthur Seligman, and the president of the Chamber of Commerce, Samuel G. Cartwright, and on the sub-committees are most of the prominent men and women of the town.

The postmaster has just completed the count of the pieces of second class mail matter coming into Estancia postoffice for the patrons of the office during the month ending August 25, and finds that Estancia people have received 7,712 newspapers and magazines during the thirty days. Evidently somebody must want to keep posted on what is going on in the world to receive this number of newspapers and magazines during such a short period.

CRAWFORD EXEMPLARY YOUNG MAN

J. A. Crawford was born at Stephenville, Texas, on February 20, 1885, being 26 years, 6 months and 18 days at his death. He graduated from the Jacksboro high school and was in the business college at Tyler when Mr. Cousins asked for a stenographer and he was sent. He was in Mr. Cousins' campaign headquarters during his first campaign for state superintendent of public instruction and after the election was made private secretary of Mr. Cousins in the state educational department. Here he remained until the establishment of the West Texas State Normal college and he was tendered a position on the faculty. During his stay in Austin he also did a great deal of work in the university and in 1907 took the state bar examinations, successfully passing them.

His work in the Normal has required a clean brain and a tireless hand, but Mr. Crawford fully satisfied both these requirements. He struggled with the problems of starting a new school until he had mastered all the details and had established an office system excelled by none and equalled by but few. His place in the secretary's office will be hard to fill.

Mr. Crawford was a member of the Christian Church, uniting when he was 14 years of age and lived a devoted Christian life until the end. He was especially fond of church work and gave a great deal of time to Sunday school, young people's meetings and to choir work. He was always at his post when the pastor wished any work done and was sure to find Mr. Crawford able and willing to do it.
