EIGHT TRUE BILLS RETURNED BY GRAND JURY

In district court yesterday morning, Judge McFie heard arguments on a demurrer filed by the defense in the case of Dunbar vs. McIntosh. Attorney Heacock appeared for the plaintiff and Attorney Dobson for the defense.

Manuel G. Martinez formerly of Willard, now of Las Vegas, appeared before the court and asked permission to change his former plea of not guilty to guilty, in a case wherein he was charged with larceny of cattle, and asked the clemency of the court. The plea was accepted, and the court sentenced the prisoner to a term of not less than eleven nor more than twelve months in the penitentiary, but suspended the sentence, during good behavior.

The grand jury made a report to the court, bringing eight true bills. Several of these are against Robert L. Howe, embezzling chief from tax cars on the cut off and also the murder of special officer McGee of the A. T. & S. F. He was the present serving sentence for the same crime. He was arrested by the Santa Fe officers, assisted by Mounted Police, attempted to place them under arrest. They fled southward across the Rio Grande into Texas. A fight followed in which the elder Howe and one son were killed and Robert Howe wounded. One of the Texas officers was also killed. Robert Howe was taken prisoner, tried and sentenced to a term in the penitentiary. It is said the Governor Campbell of Texas has signified his willingness of pardoning the man, if wanted by New Mexico authorities for trial on the grave charge.

Indictments were also returned against Edward Trujillo, a Santa Fe Police Officer, and his brother, charged with the murder of Juan P. S. on Sunday night, May 28, 1911. Trujillo is to be paroled for safe-keeping,

while the women are in the county jail here.

After the grand jury had retired, the case of the Territory vs. Doroteo Torres et al., charged with the robbery of the home of Epifanio Viji near Progresso on the night of January 13, 1910, was again taken up, the daughter of Mr. Viji being recalled by the defense.

At the hour of adjournment last evening, the testimony of the fifth witness was completed. Just how much longer the case will last cannot be foretold at this time, as the prosecution has several more witnesses, before the side of the defense can be taken up.

Van Stone's Election is now Assured

The election of Mr. Van Stone as a member of the corporation commission of the new state is now practically assured, although he may have to face a contest to hold the seat. The official canvass of the returns from Luna and McKinley counties shows that votes were cast for "S. L." Owens, whereas "S. L." Owens was the nominee. The canvassing board refused to credit these votes to the nominee which places Mr. Van Stone third in the list of six candidates. Owens will probably contest, claiming the intention of the voters was to cast their votes for him, regardless of the names on the ballot. Whether the error is one of the probate clerks of those counties in certifying the nominations to the printers, or whether it is an error of the printers is not known as yet, but the error probably lies between these parties.

DEMOGRATS WIN IN WALK IN ARIZONA

Phoenix, Ariz., Dec. 13—On the crest of a tidal wave of popular approval that exceeded even the expectations of men long schooled in the game of politics, insurgent Democracy rode into power in Arizona's first state election yesterday.

The democrats elect two United States senators, a representative in congress, a governor and the entire state ticket, and a legislature that is Democratic by a majority of probably 32 on joint ballot. The vast majority of the offices in 10 counties and all in some of them are also the fruits of the Democratic landslide.

On only one state officer is there a shadow of doubt and that is being rapidly dispelled. Fred Cleveland, Republican candidate for secretary of state, gave Sidney Osborn, his Democratic opponent, a close race, but latest returns indicate Osborn's election by a small, though safe majority. In every department of the government, the new state will be absolutely in control of the Democrats.

It is a landslide that has grown with the passing of hours and in at least one instance the claims of the state Democratic committee have been exceeded. Carl Hayden is the congressman elected from Arizona, having won over John S. Williams by 4000. Thirty-five hundred plurality was the limit of the Democratic claims.
