CAMERON FOR THE SEACOAST IDEA

Arizona Candidate Wants to See His State Have a Port of Entry for Deep Water Ships.

Tucson, Ariz., Nov. 12.—With the idea of having the United States make Arizona a seacoast state by opening a harbor on the Gulf of California, thereby making the nearest deep sea harbor to the Panama canal, Ralph H. Cameron, Republican nominee for the United States senate, will introduce a resolution, when elected, to have the state department open negotiations with Mexico.

He says the plan is to purchase from Mexico a generous figure the strip of land extending from a point on the southern boundary of Arizona to the Gulf of California, some distance below the mouth of the Colorado, approximately on the thirty-first parallel.

GOLD SNAP BRINGS TOURISTS TO CALIFORNIA

With the First Real Blasts of Winter They Come Running to More Genial and Sunny Climes.

Los Angeles, Calif., Nov. 13.—The cold snap which has held the middle west and eastern country in its grasp has started a trek to sunny southern California, and the advance guard of the tourists who come to Los Angeles to make their winter home has made its appearance at the various hotels, and the winter season can therefore be said to have begun.

Many of those who came in October have remained, and the apartment houses and the smaller hotels have begun to fill up. At the larger hotels the influx which comes to them does not, as a result, make its appearance until after the holidays.

All of the hotels anticipate that the coming winter will be one of the greatest in the history of the state for tourists, and they have prepared to cater for the big crowds that will come and that are now coming.

Those who come here to escape the cold weather come from all over the world, several of the larger hotels having already booked reservations for parties from England, Germany and France. There are also reservations made for a number of Canadians.

According to the hotel people of Los Angeles the American people are traveling more and more every year, and of the thousands of travelers a large majority come here. When they return home the stories they tell of the beauties of southern California excites their friends to want to make the trip and the result is that this winter a greater number of tourists are looked for here than ever before.

PIONEER SETTLER DECLINES HONORS

J. S. Whitlow, First White Man to Settle in Valley Near Capitan, Does Not Wish It Named After Him.

Brewell, N. M., Nov. 12.—The first white man to settle in the valley north of Capitan on the Macho, is modest. He does not say so but nevertheless he is. The man is J. S. Whitlow.

He is the first white settler in the valley to make it his home. He came there four months ago and residing there this little fertile strip of some 5,000 acres was a good thing, indeed. Friends and relatives to understand the full story there is but little land left for other less wise to get on the inside.

Realizing that to Mr. Whitlow belonged the credit of settling and cultivating the valley, his friends and neighbors endeavored to christen the valley the "Whitlow valley." Mr. Whitlow suggested another. To take every other letter in Macho and Capitan, and name it whatever it made. So the valley is named "Macatatan" and will henceforth be called that.

Great possibilities await the development of this 2,500 acres, says the early settler. Affairs produced wonderfully, as does also corn, milo maize, half corn and beans. The settlers are now thinking of getting a ditch around the Macho area. This year there have been three overflows, enough to grow good crops.

FAMOUS ELEPHANT GIVEN FUNERAL PYRE

Carrie, Oldest and Largest Performing Mastodon, Dies of Pneumonia at the Hippodrome.

The remains of Carrie, the New York Hippodrome elephant which died after an attack of pneumonia that lasted a week, have been moved from the Hippodrome animal quarters. Carrie's body was taken to Barren Island where the skin will be removed and the skeleton preserved for the Museum of Natural History. The hide will be sent to Mr. John G. Robinson of Ashbury Park.

Carrie was the oldest and largest performing elephant now appearing in public and one of the herd which takes part in the spectacular show "Around the World." She was the first elephant ever brought to the United States and appeared for the first time with the old John Robinson circus which was noted half a century ago. Carrie has been under the care of Dr. Martin J. Potter who has charge of all the animals appearing in the Hippodrome and though suffering was done to relieve the suffering of the sick elephant she failed to respond to treatment.

Carrie's understudy, Lena, has been replacing her and will continue to fill her place in the pageant of the Indian Durbars. The dead elephant was larger than Jumbo in bone structure. Her weight was six tons and she consumed four hundred pounds of hay and grain mash daily. The herd to which she belonged is owned by W. W. Powers, who is well known as an elephant trainer. Much difficulty was experienced in getting the elephant out of the Hippodrome building. A rope harness was hitched to Jennie, the next largest elephant in the herd and one end of the rope was tied about the dead animal which was then drawn out of the stall and placed on a truck, after which Jennie was hitched to the truck and in this improvised funeral carriage Carrie was drawn through the large doors which are used for the transportation of scenery, and thus to the street. Carrie weighed six tons, was 150 years old and 16 feet, 5 inches in height. She consumed 400 pounds of hay and grain each day. She was the largest performing elephant in public at the present time.
