Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 5.—Shoppilting on a wager is the newest crime wrinkle department store detectives have encountered. Detective Nick Harris arrested two women yesterday afternoon and was amazed when they laughed and declared their wagers won.

"Why, what do you mean?" exclaimed the detective when he questioned the first woman. She had stolen fifty cents' worth of dry goods and the detective did not intend to prosecute her. "I made a bet with a woman friend that I could purloin 'four bits' worth of merchandise," she explained, "and I have won the money."

Harris recovered the stolen property and dismissed the woman, assisting her to obey the law.

Woman Employed as Merely Typewriter Manipulator Writes a Few Pithy Sayings and Is Made Superintendent's Secretary.

Chicago, Ill., Dec. 25.—Because a girl stenographer had ideas, and jotted down in epigrammatic form, she is now secretary to the superintendent and a neat card bearing the epigrams so discovered has been sent each stenographer in the service. The girl is Miss Helen Lee Brooks, who, since the discovery, has found herself the secretary of the division superintendent of the Illinois Central railroad at Madison, Ill.

Here are some of the epigrams from her notebook cover which have been sent out:

"The girl who prides herself on being a 'good fellow' ought not to complain when men in the office take her at her word."

OKLAMOMANS NOT LIMITED TO GALLON

Oklahoma City, Okla., Dec. 25.—That portion of the state prohibition law limiting the amount of intoxicating liquor which may be kept in a place of business to one quart and in a private residence to one gallon was set by a knockout blow by the criminal court of appeals in an opinion by Judge Armstrong Thursday, when the statute was declared in violation of both the state and federal constitutions.

The case was brought before the court of last resort in original matters by an application for a writ of habeas corpus filed by W. J. Wilson or Ardmore, who was arrested charged with having in his possession three quarts of alcohol. The case was submitted upon an agreed statement of facts, and the only question before the court was the constitutionality of the statute. The statute limiting the amount which may be kept in a private home to one gallon was not an issue, but the question is identical the same, and it is stated by Judge Armstrong that the ruling will operate to also put that provision of the law out of operation.

Judge Armstrong, in the opinion of the court, cites a long list of decisions from the federal courts and the highest courts of many states. It is held that the statute is in violation of section 7, article 2, of the state constitution, in that it deprives a citizen of the United States of his property without due process of law. It is in violation of the Fourteenth amendment to the federal constitution, which provides that no state shall pass any law which deprives any citizen of the United States of his property without due process of law.

Under the statute which was abolished today, the mere possession of intoxicating liquor over the amount stipulated in the law was sufficient evidence upon which to return a verdict of guilty of violation of the liquor laws, and many convictions have been obtained under the statute. The statute has been the means of driving many bootleggers of the state out of business.
