

# CHARMED CORPSES BURIED DEEP IN TUNNEL

## Exploring Parties Cannot Reach Bodies for Days; Villa Vows Vengeance on Bandit Castillo.

[By Leased Wire to Evening Herald.] Juarez, Mexico, Feb. 8.—It may be several days before exploring parties can reach the bodies in the Cumbre tunnel. Earth and rock have fallen in both ends, and as the fire is still burning work is slow. General Villa, who returned to Juarez yesterday, declared that he would redouble efforts to crush the bandit Maximo Castillo, who is held responsible for the disaster.

# VILLA PROMISES TO RESPECT ALL FOREIGNERS

Washington, Feb. 8.—Indirectly assurances have been received at the White House from General Villa for the proper treatment of foreigners. Representations by American consular officers on the necessity of extending to Spaniards as well as all foreign subjects equal protection have met with compliance.

At the same time General Villa, it is understood, will not be disposed to ignore active participation by foreigners in the cause of General Huerta, but will extend to any foreign combatants, however, the right of trial. In the main the administration here is disposed to regard as satisfactory General Villa's assurances.

# ENGINE EXPLODES; AVIATOR DIES

## Lieutenant in U. S. Army Aero Corps Plunges 500 Feet to Death From Wrecked Hydroaeroplane.

[By Leased Wire to Evening Herald.] San Diego, Cal., Feb. 8.—Lieut. H. B. Post, first aero corps U. S. A., was instantly killed by a fall of 500 feet in a hydroaeroplane. About 150 feet from the surface of the bay Lieutenant Post was seen to shoot clear of the machine. It was said by watchers that the engine exploded. Lieutenant Post was flying for an altitude record. He had the reputation of being the best aviator in the army camp on North Island, across the bay from San Diego.

# SIXTEEN VICTIMS OF GOVERNMENT AVIATION

Washington, Feb. 9.—Second Lieutenant Henry B. Post was born in New York June 15, 1887, and was commissioned as second lieutenant of the Twenty-fifth infantry in 1911. His death makes a total of sixteen in government aviation since 1908; fifteen in the army and one in the navy. In aviation the world over, approximately 425 persons have met death since 1908, eleven having been killed during the present year.


When the Potomac abandoned her attempt on Thursday to liberate ice-bound fishing vessels, she was short of coal and was using her reserve supply.

# ONE SUBPOENA THAT DID NOT GET SERVED

## Albuquerque Woman Sought by Arizona Attorneys Found on Operating Table in St. Joseph's; District Court Notes.

Mrs. Theo Young of Albuquerque has been subpoenaed to appear as a witness in the case of the state of Arizona vs. Atha Leonard and John Tomlin, who are to be tried in Maricopa county on February 16th on a murder charge. It is more correct to state, perhaps, that the subpoena for Mrs. Young, who is considered an important witness for the defense, has been issued, as it has not yet been served. When the deputy sheriff sought Mrs. Young this morning he found her on the operating table in St. Joseph's sanitarium, having just undergone a successful operation for appendicitis. The service of the paper was delayed.

Sereno Sena this morning was given 30 days in the county jail or a fine of \$25 and costs attached by Justice of the Peace Craig.

# District Court Notes.

Judge Haynolds this afternoon completed hearing of argument in the case of the Gallup Electric Light and Power company vs. the People's Electric Light and Power company, which was begun on Saturday.

The court gave judgment approving the report of Hugh J. Collins as special master in the case of Donaciano Gallegos vs. the unknown heirs of Diego Montoya, et al. showing disbursements of \$7,386.29 by the special master and \$7,897.71 paid into the hands of the district clerk for distribution among claimants.

Comse Lopez today filed suit against Trinidad G. de Griego for possession of a homestead in Sandoval county, alleged to be unlawfully held by the defendant, and \$300 damages for several months' alleged unlawful tenure.

# FEDERAL LEAGUE MENACE CAUSES CONFERENCE

## Vigorous Fight on Outlaws Chief Topic of Discussion at Gathering of Baseball Magistrates in New York.

[By Leased Wire to Evening Herald.] New York, Feb. 8.—Baseball owners and officers gathered here today. The announced purpose of their visit is to attend the scheduled meetings of the International league, the National league and the American league. The real purpose is the menace of the Federal league.

The International was the first to meet in regular session. It held its meeting today and discussed the schedule for the coming season. Tomorrow the National league will meet for the same purpose and on Wednesday the American league will adopt its 1914 playing dates.

Through it all ways and means to fight the Federal league will be infamously discussed so that on Thursday, when a joint session is to be held, it is expected that plans will have been formulated for an aggressive campaign against the so-called outlaws.

President Chivington and some of the American association club owners are expected to take part in Thursday's conference.

Just what line of action is likely to be decided upon is not clear. The scheme proposed some time ago of putting International league an American association teams in cities where the Federals propose to locate club seems to be the most favorably considered. Some of the baseball owners, among them August Herrmann of Cincinnati, are inclined to think the Federal menace is a bubble that will burst before long anyway, so far as this season is concerned.

Rumors persisted during the meeting here today of the baseball managers of the International league, that the franchise of the Jersey City club would be transferred to Brooklyn in order to discourage the Federal league from entering that city.
