Cincinnati.—A trans-Atlantic trip in an aeroplane is at the present time impracticable.

"It would be foolhardy for an aviator to try this trip with the engine now used in aeroplanes."

Thus Orville Wright, one of the pioneer builders of "heavier than air" machines, answered questions as to whether he would enter the lists with other aviators who declare they will try a trip across the Atlantic in their machines.

"The machines as they are now built have not the staying power required for a voyage of this length, and under no circumstances will the engines hold out under the continuous strain of such a journey."

"Efforts have been made to cover the same distance on land and have failed, and while necessity may force many things, it will not bolster up a weak engine when once the let-down comes."

### AVIATION NOTES

New York.—The Aero Club of America yesterday deferred action on the application for granting a sanction for the proposed round-the-world aviation race from the Panama-Pacific exposition at San Francisco next year. It was decided to consider the subject further.

The club sent a cablegram to the Royal Aero Club of the United Kingdom, asking if an entry of the proposed trans-Atlantic expedition which Rodman Wanamaker is planning to finance would be accepted at once for the London Daily Mail prize. The pilot for the Wanamaker flier has not been selected. The American club informed the British organization that it was prepared to make formal entry of the Wanamaker airship.

Glen H. Curtis, present at the meeting, replied to the opinion expressed by Orville Wright in Cincinnati that machines as now constructed could not make the trip.

San Francisco.—Silas Christofferson, the aviator, who attempted a flight from San Francisco to San Diego, telephoned his wife here last night that he would return here for a new engine with which to get his machine over Telon pass, 2,600 feet.

Christofferson made two unsuccessful attempts to fly over the pass. He started from here Monday morning.

Johannishoff.—The performances of German aviators this year have greatly surpassed expectations, the committee of the national aviation fund announced that the fund of \$125,000 assigned for the payment of premiums to aviators making long endurance flights has been practically exhausted and consequently no further premiums can be paid.
