LIGHT COMPANY HAS PROPOSITION FOR NEW SYSTEM

Manager Submits Plan to Install Ornamental Poles With Tungstens on All-Night Schedule; Cheaper for Consumer, Claim.

Manager A. F. Van Dine has submitted to the city a proposition to change the present street lighting system by installing ornamental poles with tungstens instead of the arcs, substituting an all-night schedule for the moonlight schedule. The all-night schedule for street lights have approximately 4,000 hours of light during the year instead of 2,000, and naturally the service being twice as long requires double the amount of energy to supply the same. However, there are other types of lighting which are more economical in the use of energy than the present system of arc lighting. In order to give the citizens of Albuquerque an idea of the different types of lighting we have put up on the corner of Fifth street and Gold avenue a light which can be substituted for the arc lamps and burned on all night schedule at a cost of only 25 per cent above the present cost of arc lights on a moonlight schedule. We have also installed in the block on Second street between Iron and Stover avenues four (4) wooden posts showing how a street may be illuminated at short intervals by lamps of smaller capacity and the average illumination along the streets will be greater than with the present system of arc lamps.

since the amount of illumination of the buildings and trees on the streets prevent the illumination of the streets by the moon, even during the period of its greatest brilliancy.

Albuquerque is the largest town in the state of New Mexico and is certain to be visited by a great many tourists and others who will attend the exposition in San Francisco during the coming year. The greater proportion of the transcontinental trains arrive in this city after dark and the impression of Albuquerque left in the minds of travelers is influenced to a very great extent by the illumination of the town and we believe that the city can well consider at the present time the operation of its street lights on what is commonly known as the all night schedule instead of the moonlight schedule. The all night schedule for street lights have approximately 4,000 hours of light during the year instead of 2,000, and naturally the service being twice as long requires double the amount of energy to supply the same. However, there are other types of lighting which are more economical in the use of energy than the present system of arc lighting. In order to give the citizens of Albuquerque an idea of the different types of lighting we have put up on the corner of Fifth street and Gold avenue a light which can be substituted for the arc lamps and burned on all night schedule at a cost of only 25 per cent above the present cost of arc lights on a moonlight schedule. We have also installed in the block on Second street between Iron and Stover avenues four (4) wooden posts showing how a street may be illuminated at short intervals by lamps of smaller capacity and the average illumination along the streets will be greater than with the present system of arc lamps.

The posts on Second street are not supposed to be installed for those which would be installed for instead of the wooden posts as at present erected on Second street we would expect to put in posts similar to the illustration herewith; these posts to be made of cast iron and painted such a color as might be desired by the city council. The total height of the post to the top of the globe to be 12 feet and each post to be equipped with lamps of the same size as are at present burned

on Second street, at the location before mentioned. Two of these posts can be supplied at the same cost as one all night light burning at the intersection of the streets.

In order to have the lighting system of the town consistent we would suggest that at the expiration of the ornamental lighting contracts at present in force that the city assume the same and if they will do so we will rewrite these systems and operate the three lamps on the ornamental lighting posts on Central avenue and First street from dusk until midnight and the top lamp on each post from midnight until dawn. This will relieve the city of the necessity of operating the arc lamps at the intersections of the streets now covered by the ornamental lighting systems. Also upon the expiration of the Second street lighting contract we will change this system of lighting so that it will conform with the plans of the ornamental lighting on Central avenue and First street. The plan for the lighting of Second street will be to substitute four tungsten lamps, enclosed in 12-inch opal glass globes, on an ornamental iron bracket mounted on the pole. These lights will be furnished on all the poles on Second street with the exception of the four (4) poles on the corner of Second street and Central avenue, inasmuch as if these brackets were applied to these poles there would be an interference of the two lighting systems on Second street and Central avenue.

Again referring to the single light ornamental post which may be distributed along the block, we are also enclosing another sketch showing the distribution of these lights which we believe would give the most economical distribution of light. Referring to this sketch, one ornamental single light post is located on the corner, as shown in block "A," and the lights are spaced 200 feet distance from this post on each side of the street both ways from this corner and on the corner diagonally opposite the same spacing is carried out. This gives a total of six posts for every city block and the corner post lighting the streets each way from the corner. If this same system is carried out in each block it will result in spacing the posts 100 feet apart on opposite sides of the street. The distribution of light would be about as shown in the block lettered "B" on this sketch, the semicircles showing the distribution of light from each one of the various standards. In this way the three posts are actually paid for per running block of street although the effect is the same as if four posts were placed in each block inasmuch as the corner post is of service on each one of the intersecting streets. For your information we would state that the poles in the block on Second street between Iron and Stover are arranged in accordance with this plan. This system of lighting would be applicable to the more densely populated districts and those which are more often frequented by visitors to our city, such as East Central avenue east of the railroad tracks and West Central avenue from the end of the present ornamental lighting system to Robinson park and some of the streets which are not lighted by ornamental systems down town and in the more densely populated residential districts where the trees will interfere with the distribution of the light where the lamps are located only on the street intersections. For the outlying districts which are not densely populated and where it would not be feasible to put in these single light posts, lights similar to the one on the corner of Fifth and Gold could be installed and all night service furnished.

If the city will enter into a contract with this company for a system of street illumination similar to that outlined above, the company will reduce its rates to residences and business consumers on the following schedule:

1st. Residence lighting will be supplied at a primary rate of 13 1/2c per K. W. gross and a secondary rate of 8c per K. W. The primary rate will be charged for all monthly consumption through one meter for the following quantities: For a 4-room or less residence, 14 K. W. H. per month. For a 5-room residence, 20 K. W. H. per month. For each additional room in private residences, 3 K. W. H. per month.

All of the above to be billed at the rate of 13 1/2c, and for such electrical energy as residence consumers may use in excess of the above amounts will be billed at the rate of 8c per K. W. For instance, supposing a certain consumer had a residence of 3

rooms and during one month used 30 K. W. H. of electrical energy; this consumer would be billed for 20 K. W. H. at the rate of 13 1/2c per K. W. H. and for 10 K. W. H. at the rate of 8c per K. W. H. Furthermore, provided that this consumer will pay his bill before the 10th of the month a discount of 1/2c per K. W. H. will be made for prompt payment; so that the actual net primary rate will be 13c per K. W. H. and the secondary rate 7 1/2c per K. W. H. This rate will be substituted for the present lighting rate of 13 1/2c per K. W. H. which is charged for electric service immaterial of the quantity used by the respective consumers. For business lighting: The first 100 K. W. H. used per month will be charged for at the rate of 12c per K. W. H. The second 100 K. W. H. used per month will be charged for at the rate of 10 1/2c per K. W. H. The third 100 K. W. H. used per month will be charged for at the rate of 9c per K. W. H. The fourth 100 K. W. H. used per month will be charged for at the rate of 8c per K. W. H. For all in excess of 400 K. W. H. per month will be charged at the rate of 6c per K. W. H. These rates mentioned are gross rates and to each consumer who will pay his bill on or before the 10th of the month we will allow discount of 1/2c per K. W. H. for prompt payment. As an alternative business rate to the above for consumers using long hour service we will make a rate as follows: A fixed accounting charge of \$1.00 per month per meter and a service charge of 15c per meter for every 50 watts connected load, plus an energy charge of 5 1/2c per K. W. H. for all metered consumption, and from the above bill we will allow a discount of 1/2c per K. W. H. for payment within ten days from the date of the bill as rendered. Minimum monthly bill for both business and residence consumers, \$1.50 per month. Assuming that none of the residence consumers ever use sufficient electrical energy so that their consumption will entitle them to be billed on the secondary rate of 8c per K. W. H., the total saving to the citizens of Albuquerque under the above system of rates would have amounted to \$1,250.00 during the past year. We would also call your attention to the fact that we have a large number of consumers who will be billed for energy on the secondary rate if they continue to use electrical service in the same amount as they have during the year just passed. If the city decides to contract with this company for street lighting on the above basis and due to such contract reduce the lighting rates to every one of the citizens of the community the total bill for street lighting on an all night schedule will be increased by a smaller amount than the total saving effected by the citizens. In addition the citizens who are now defraying the cost of the ornamental lighting system on Central avenue and First street and Second street will be relieved of any further expense in connection with these ornamental lighting contracts, when such contracts expire and are taken over by the city; so that the citizens as a whole will be paying a smaller total bill for lighting service and in addition will have the benefit of all night lights in every part of the city, will have a new system of ornamental lights on Second street, which will conform in appearance to the other ornamental lighting systems, and will also have a means of extending the ornamental lighting systems by use of the single light ornamental posts, as shown by the cut herewith, at only a slightly increased expense over and above the cost of street lighting at the intersections under the present method of distribution. This system of street lighting by ornamental iron posts along the sides of the street is gaining in favor in every locality in the United States.

The type of post shown in this cut is similar to the post used along Sheridan Road, in Chicago, Ill.; also in Rochester, N. Y.; Oklahoma City, Okla.; Pueblo, Mexico; Cincinnati, Ohio; Washington, D. C.; Toledo, Ohio; Raribault, Minn.; Newark, Ohio; Bloomington, Ind.; Portland, Oregon; Spokane, Wash.; Syracuse, N. Y.; New Haven, Conn.; Dayton, Ohio; Topeka, Kan.; Phoenix, Ariz.; Redlands, Cal.; Pasadena, Cal.; and many other towns not only in the United States but abroad. We respectfully recommend this proposition to you for your consideration and we might state in closing that there are 257 cities in the United States which have adopted the distributed type of lighting as exemplified by the installation between Iron and Stover avenues on Second street.
