INTER-CITY TRACK MEET WILL BE HELD SATURDAY

The inter-city track meet between the University of New Mexico, Menaul school and Indian school will be held Saturday afternoon. If the Indians win, they will become permanent possessors of the O. A. Matson trophy, which they have captured in the last two meetings.

University Hopes to Check Indian Schools Campaign for the Matson Trophy—Probable Entries.

The University and Menaul teams, however, are primed for a determined effort to check the redskins' string of victories. The University has plenty of good material and the Cherry and Silver are confident of carrying off premier honors. Entries will not be made until this afternoon, so no official information is available at this writing, but it is expected that the University will enter for the 100-yard dash, Matt Higgins and Joe McCanna; for the 220-yard dash, the same; for the 440-yard dash, Ira Boldt and Chet Lee, or Lee Chaire Murphy; for the 120-yard hurdles, Ira Boldt and L. B. Lackey; for the weights, Rex Brashear and Chet Lee; for the mile relay, Boldt, Lackey, Murphy and Higgins.

McCanna and Higgins are doing excellent work in the dashes; Lackey, Boldt and Lee are up to their usual high standard and Brashear is expected to do something with the weights.

How the University team performs will serve as a line on what may be expected when the Cherry and Silver meet the state college team at Las Cruces May 23 in a dual meet. The "Aggies" were decisive victors last year, but the University expects to reverse the verdict this year.

GOVERNOR HOPES ROAD BONDS MAY SOON BE SOLD

Anxious to Get to Work on Large Scale in State Highway Improvement; Bonds Being Advertised.

NO FURTHER DANGER OF TROUBLE ON BORDER

Governor William C. McDonald is spending the day in Albuquerque on personal business, having arrived last night. He expects to return to the capital this evening.

"I do not think we need have any further uneasiness as to conditions on the New Mexico border, at least not for the present," said the governor this morning. "I received a number of requests from border towns for the state militia and for my assistance in securing regular troops, and did all that could be done under the circumstances. It is not surprising that the people in exposed places like Columbus and Rodeo and Lordsburg should have been alarmed. So far as the present is concerned, however, the danger is over.

"Our militia is in better shape, I believe, than it ever has been. The Roswell battery is on a war footing and a majority of the companies are recruited to full strength. The men are interested in their work and I am much pleased with the whole condition of the organization. We have had it been necessary to use the troops in the recent ugly situation we would have been embarrassed by what seems to be a very short-sighted policy in not providing funds for emergency service. However, the trouble is happily past and should it recur we will have found a way to make the troops available should need arise.
