Bears Control Wheat.

Chicago, June 26.—Bears today reasserted control of wheat. In a general rush of selling prices went still lower than on any occasion since the recent sensational declines began. The opening, which was 1/2 to 1 cent under last night, was followed by an additional 3/4.

Corn dropped with wheat and as a result of predicted showers where needed. After opening unchanged to 1/4 cent lower the market continued to descend.

Oats had no substantial support. Packers unloaded provisions. First transactions ranged from 2 1/2 to 10 cents down and there was further weakness later on.

NO DEFINITE WORD RECEIVED FROM CARRANZA

Mediators Mark Time While Awaiting Further Developments; Huerta Delegates Refuse Comment on Zacatecas Victory.

(By Leased Wire to Evening Herald.) Niagara Falls, Ont., June 26.—Mediators and American and Huerta delegates were inactive today, awaiting definite word from the constitutional agency in Washington as to the time and place for the informal conference between the opposing Mexican factions.

It is considered unlikely the parties between the Huerta and constitutionalist representatives will take place here nor is it probable any city in the United States will be chosen for the conference. Ottawa and general reports on Lake Ontario have been mentioned. The Huerta delegates have refused to comment on the taking of Zacatecas.

UNITED STATES HAS SET GRAND EXAMPLE

Buenos Ayres, Argentina, June 26.—La Nacion says the solution reached in the dispute between the United States and Mexico could not be better, and adds: "The United States has set a grand example to the world and has won the respect of the nations by the equanimity and spirit of justice with which she has comported herself under the circumstances."

Mexican Senate to Meet

Mexico City, June 27.—The Mexican senate is to meet tomorrow to hear the executive's report on the outcome of mediation conferences at Niagara Falls. Optimism prevails generally and the inhabitants of the capital are planning a big demonstration in honor of the South American mediators. Prominent politicians express the belief that peace will be restored in Mexico before long.

Ironworkers Begin Sentences

Leavenworth, Kan., June 26.—Twelve structural ironworkers convicted in the dynamic conspiracy cases, whose application for pardon was denied by President Wilson Wednesday, returned to the United States prison at 10 o'clock tonight to serve out sentences interrupted when they left the prison upon bond.

Federal Attorney in Plead Guilty

Honolulu, June 26.—Jeff McCann, United States attorney for the territory of Hawaii, indicted recently by the federal grand jury for assault with a deadly weapon, will plead to the charge next Monday, it has been announced. McCann is accused specifically of attacking Claudius McBride, opposing counsel in a law suit, with a pistol. He previously was indicted by the territorial grand jury.
