## HOVEY SAYS ROAD CONVENTION WAS A WINNER

Well Known Carlsbad Publicity Man Pleased with Results Accomplished at Santa Fe Meeting.

A. M. Hovey, veteran publicity man of the Pecos valley, and one of the men whose work resulted in the building of the Carlsbad reclamation project, is spending today in Albuquerque, returning to his home in Carlsbad from Santa Fe, where he attended the state road convention.

"The road meeting was a great success," said Mr. Hovey this morning, "and it will accomplish permanent results in road building and general development throughout the state."

"One thing I think this convention has done is to bring home to the people of the Rio Grande valley, the older settled and historical section of New Mexico, the fact that to the east and west of the valley vitally energetic communities are springing up, which are playing an important part in the construction of the state, and that a more harmonious connection with these new sections will be of mutual value. The convention was a practical working body which went at its business in an effective way. Naturally results will follow."

"The good roads enthusiasm has struck us hard in Eddy county. We have an enthusiastic association and we are going to build roads in 1915 which will make us the best highway county in New Mexico."
