According to Mr. Gourley, officers have been granted the privilege of electing to stay in the United States if they so desire. While the constitutionalists have issued a proclamation of amnesty, it covers only the rank and file of the federal army, the officers being still subject to whatever disposition the new government may choose to make of them as enemies of the Carranzistas. To send them back to Mexico, it is feared, would be to sentence many of them to death, so they have been given an opportunity to stay in America.

## MAKING READY TO FREE MEXICANS AT WINGATE

Officers Have Been Given the Privilege of Remaining in the Country, Subjective to Immigration Rulings.

### SOME EXPECTED TO COME TO THIS CITY

The Santa Fe railroad is sending cars to Fort Wingate in preparation for the movement of the Mexicans interned there to the border, where they are to be set at liberty. Wagons have been coming to Wingate from points west for several days, and last night ten coaches were sent from the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe to the second No. 1. Eighteen coaches from eastern points were received here last night. They will be sent to Wingate today or tomorrow.

Troops from Fort Bliss, who with their baggage occupies five cars, arrived here last night and left soon after on second No. 1 for the prison fort. They will guard the Mexicans on the trip to the border.
