# GRAND JURY BRINGS IN TWENTY-SEVEN INDICTMENTS

Report Recommends a New Safe for the County Treasurer and a Women's Addition to the Jail.

## NO BILLS FOUND IN NINE CASES TAKEN UP

Indictments in twenty-seven cases have been found by the grand jury, which filed its report with District Judge Herbert F. Reynolds today. In nine cases no bill of indictment was returned. The jury examined 100 witnesses during the seven days of its session.

The report embodies a number of recommendations. The jury found need for an addition to the jail, for women prisoners, and for a new structure in which to keep the county's funds. The county treasurer's office, the jury reported, has not a proper safe for the protection of money. Management of the county offices and the jail is commended warmly.

Following is a list of those in whose cases the grand jury reported no bill of indictment:

Della Deason, Jose Zamora, Uvaldo Sanchez, Severo Lucero, Fidel Romero and Pedro Jaramillo, Nicolas Rodriguez, Ignacio Gonzalez, Alvarado Moyra, P. A. Lyons, Harvey McVay, Forrest Fidelity and George Etcho. The jury went through its work with marked celerity. Court and county officials said today it was one of the best grand juries ever drawn in this county. J. T. McLaughlin was the foreman and J. E. Hannum the secretary.

Following is the jury's report: "To the Honorable Herbert F. Reynolds, Judge of the District Court: "Sir: We, the grand jury empaneled and sworn on the 21st day of September, 1914, for the September term of the district court, have completed our investigations and beg to submit to you the following report: "We have been in session each day from September 21st to September 28th inclusive, except Sunday the 27th, and in considering such cases as have been brought before this body for investigation have found 27 true bills and have found no bill in nine cases, a total of 100 witnesses having been called to testify.

"We have made investigation regarding the enforcing of the law relative to compulsory school attendance and find that the law is apparently being enforced in a proper manner. "In accordance with the law we have made a very careful examination of the county jail and the county buildings and have to earnestly recommend as follows: "That a bath be provided at once for use of prisoners in the jail, such facilities now being lacking. "Also that an addition to the jail be constructed as soon as possible on the west end of the main building, preferably of cement blocks to conform with the present structure, this addition to contain quarters suitable for women prisoners and where they may be kept completely isolated from male prisoners, which it is not possible to do with present facilities. Also to have separate bath and toilet for exclusive use of women prisoners.

"We also would recommend that the old adobe building now used for certain women prisoners be replaced by a more substantial building and that it be provided with proper toilet facilities for their use.

"We are pleased to report that the present buildings and quarters are kept in very fair condition, the kitchen particularly being clean and the prisoners all apparently satisfactorily fed.

"We recommend, however, that some of the beds and bedding in the women's quarters in the old adobe building should be destroyed and replaced with iron cots provided with mattresses and covering which may be cleaned when occasion requires. "At the court house we find the various offices to be conducted in a most businesslike manner, all records being kept carefully and systematically, the physical condition of the various records and documents all showing the painstaking manner in which they are handled by the various officers and employes.

"We have also examined the various quarters in the court house and find that additional fireproof vault facilities are seriously needed in the office of the district clerk. We would recommend that such a vault be provided by making proper changes in the wing north of the main office room of the district clerk.

"We also find that the county treasurer's office is not equipped with a proper strong box or safe suitable for the protection of money, and we recommend that same be provided as soon as possible.

"We also find that in several of the offices the walls are in need of repapering, and the floors should be repapered, especially in the offices of the sheriff, the district clerk and the county clerk.

"We find also that no proper room or quarters are provided for the comfort and convenience of witnesses, who are now obliged to wait in the hallways, frequently for a great length of time and in considerable discomfort, and we recommend that some room be prepared for their use if any is available.

"We recommend also that all wooden floors which are now in vaults used for storing records be replaced with concrete floors, and wooden shelving replaced with steel shelving as soon as possible.

"We believe also that the health of many persons is endangered by the use of the extremely unsanitary cuspidors now in the court house and

that they should be replaced with metal cuspidors.

"We wish to extend to the district attorney, Mr. M. U. Vigil, our sincere thanks for his promptness in bringing the various cases, and presenting the many witnesses before this body, thus greatly facilitating our work in the consideration and disposal of the various cases.

"We wish also to thank Sheriff Romero and his deputy, Mr. Dick Lewis, for their courtesy in conducting us through the jail and other county buildings, and for the careful and detailed explanations of the various matters connected with the sheriff's office.

Press of business made it impossible for the twenty-sixth session of the Presbyterian church to finish its meeting yesterday as planned and a program was made up for today occupying the entire day, the synod expecting to adjourn sine die tonight.

At yesterday's meeting Rev. Dr. John E. Gaas, for years synodical worker in New Mexico, was re-elected to that position. Rev. H. Steel was elected state evangelist, the position having been unfilled in New Mexico heretofore. The election marks a further extension in active church work. A reorganization of the home mission committee also has been effected with a view to more extensive work in that department.

Yesterday the members of the synod enjoyed an automobile ride to the Menaul mission school, where they made an inspection of that institution. They also visited the Indian school and the University and inspected the Presbyterian sanitarium.

This morning at 11 o'clock Rev. George E. McCune, of Korea, a missionary whose addresses have added materially to the interest of the sessions, preached a sermon. Tonight at 7:30 the final popular meeting will be held and will be devoted to Sunday school and mission work. Mr. McCune being scheduled for an address on "The Children of Korea."

## VISITING MINISTERS OCCUPY LOCAL PULPITS SUNDAY

The pulpits of the city were filled yesterday by the visiting members of the synod. Large congregations were at all the churches to hear the deliverances of the visiting ecclesiastics on their favorite subjects.

The most popular speaker among them all was Rev. Mr. McCune, the missionary who has worked so long in Korea. He told many incidents illustrating the character of the Korean Christians, which were very commendable.

A Unique Report. The committee on resolutions made its report at the evening service which was most heartily endorsed, and is as follows:

In the busy days of autumn, in the days of mild September, to a fair and gracious city, To the lovely Albuquerque, Came a host of hungry preachers, Came a horde of famished persons, Came with wives and came with children.

Came for work and came for eating, Straightway they went from train to table, Quick they fell to savage eating, Ate all morn and ate all noonday, Ate at eve—would still be eating, Were it not for Synod meeting.

Here the strangers found a welcome, Here they found a hearty greeting; Found a town of rarest beauty, Found a verdant, fertile valley, Found a church to hold their meetings.

Reports on La Aurora, education and church narrative were made and the synod adjourned at noon to 1:30 this afternoon to finish its business.

1. You are advised that this troop is directed to take part in the state fair at Albuquerque, N. M., October 2th to 19th, 1914; that it will arrive at Albuquerque about 11 o'clock a. m. Saturday, October 3rd, by marching; that the command will consist of 3 officers, 66 enlisted men, and 75 horses and mules.

2. I respectfully request that you cause provisions to be made for a good camp site for men and animals; for a supply of 10 or 12 cords of wood at the camp site by the time of arrival, Saturday, October 3rd.

3. Ration and forage supply will be provided for by me.
