JUDGE DISMISSES CHARGE AGAINST MIN CARROLL

No Proof of Violation Brought by the City; First Case Under the New Anti-Redlight Ordinance.

The case against Minnie Carroll, charged with conducting a house of ill-repute at her residence on North Third street in the heart of the former restricted district, was dismissed by Police Judge George H. Craig last evening. It was the first case of its kind under the new ordinance that closed up the redlight district.

There was no evidence to substantiate the charge. While the new ordinance is drastic and sweeping, and provides that the general reputation of a house is sufficient to establish a case, the prosecution in this case found that particular section a broken record. The ordinance itself virtually re-established the reputation of the restricted district, because the prompt and vigorous enforcement of the law by the police made the impression general that the resorts were "out of business." To secure conviction against the old resorts at this juncture will require specific proof of violations since the ordinance went into effect. The city at last evening's hearing could produce no testimony of violations.

Mrs. Carroll has an appeal against a conviction for selling liquor without a license pending. She was fined \$25 by Judge Craig at a trial held Tuesday. Both charges grew out of a raid made on her home by Capt. Paul Kennedy Monday night.
