NEW OFFICIAL ROSTER OF THE SECTIONS BEING FORMED

While a number of the sections had not completed their official roster for next year, a majority had elected officers and named their council members at noon today. In the Indian school section P. T. Lowrey was elected president and T. A. Norman secretary, with Claude M. Bean as member of the council for the three-year term, Emma Dawson for two years and Mr. Lowrey for the one-year term.

The city superintendent's section elected W. G. Hall of Roswell, president; E. W. Twining, secretary; W. L. Bishop of Gallup, educational council for three years; Wallace B. McFarland of Silver City, two years, and T. W. Conway of Haton, one year.

The new foreign language section organized with Dr. Marshall Murray as president; Miss Mesely as vice president; Miss Decker, secretary; Mrs. Stecker of Deming, member of the council for three years; Mr. L. Schmitt of Silver City, for two years, and Miss Hewitt of Alamogordo for one year.

SCHOOL BOARD SECTION

The school board section met Wednesday morning. President J. G. L. Swinney and Secretary Willard E. Holt in their respective chairs. The subject of "The Problem of Employing Teachers" was very ably handled by President M. E. Hickey of the Albuquerque board of education. President Hickey suggested, among other things, that the superintendent should select the corps of teachers, as he is the responsible one. He was of the opinion that other things being equal, an attractive, neatly dressed teacher ought to be given preference. He advised not to mix politics with school affairs. The matter was discussed by members of the various boards of education, and a few superintendents throughout the state.

As Governor McDonald was detained on other business, Willard E. Holt of Deming was assigned his place on the program in presenting the subject, "How School Officials May Help the Teacher to Greater Success."

The subject of "Patriotism in the Public School" was presented by President Swinney in the absence of Colonel Sosa, and a discussion of instruction was general.

A resolution was unanimously adopted to next year invite all city and county superintendents to attend the meeting of the school board section, and that the meeting be called

for the morning of the first day's session.

Members of the educational council, as reorganized, now stand: John Morrow of Haton, one year; Willard E. Holt of Deming, two years; M. E. Hickey of Albuquerque, three years.

DR. ROBERTS SPEAKS TO THE COLLEGE SECTION

Many of the sections were still in session at noon today, with the probability that they would not reach election of officers until this evening. One of these was the elementary section, which was occupied the entire morning with the reading of papers and addresses by the visiting educators, and another was the high school and college section. At this section Dr. Frank H. H. Roberts of the Normal university delivered a

forthright address on "Ideals in College Work." The speaker directed and benefited of education section held an all morning session with a number of interesting addresses.

County Superintendents

The county superintendents' section this morning engaged in a busy half-hour debate on educational qualifications of county superintendents, based on a resolution dismissing all educational requirements in a proposed recommendation to the legislature. The proposed recommendation finally was defeated by a close vote, with about one-half the members present. The section elected the following officers:

The Oratorical Section

W. G. Hall of Roswell and Miss Jean Forsyth of the Silver City Normal school have proved such satisfactory managers of oratorical contests that they were unanimously elected president and secretary for the ensuing year at the meeting of the oratorical section this morning. R. W. Twining was elected vice president.

More New Sections

Organization of a section for high school principals was begun this morning, with every indication that it would be completed in tonight. There is a section for high school and college work, and also for city superintendents. The proposed section is for high school principals only.

A state athletic association, proposed as a section of the association, also is being organized. At a conference this morning a committee was named to prepare the plan of organization, which it is hoped to complete tonight. The special work of the association will be the standardizing of athletics in New Mexico schools and colleges, a work that is greatly needed. The organization now being formed will be confined to high school athletics with the idea that later it may be extended to all grades of school work in athletics.
