**MONA BELL'S JURY
UNABLE TO REACH
AGREEMENT**

Find Her Not Guilty on One
Count But Split Hopelessly
on Two Others; Discharged
at Noon.

Unable to agree on two of the three counts in the indictment, the jury in the case of Mona Bell, charged with violation of the white slave law, was discharged in the red-clay court early this afternoon. The jury reported finally at 12:15 o'clock. It took the case last night, but gave up deliberations and went to bed shortly after midnight.

The jurors agreed on the third count—finding the defendant not guilty. That count charged Mona Bell with inducing the three girls who figured in the case to engage in immoral practices. The other two counts charged that she enticed and induced the girls to go from Denver to Santa Fe, and furnished transportation. The verdict leaves Miss Bell under two charges.

The case went to the jury late last night. After an hour's deliberation the jury reported at midnight that it had reached an agreement on one count, but not on the other two. The court directed adjournment until 8 o'clock this morning and instructed the jury to try again. The jurors made a few futile attempts to reach agreement and then went to bed.

Yurchikoff Sentenced.

Philip Yurchikoff, of Gallup, convicted last week of selling liquor to an Indian, was sentenced today. He will be confined in the penitentiary at Santa Fe for six months and must pay a fine of \$100 and costs.

**SIXTY DAYS FOR BOY
WHO STOLE BICYCLE**

Raymond Harrison, colored, in whose possession a bicycle that didn't belong to him was found, was sentenced today, to 60 days in jail by Judge McClellan in the police court.

The bicycle was identified and claimed by its owner, a youth, last night. Harrison was seen riding the bicycle in a barn on North Fourth street, and that led to his arrest.

**CAFE CHANGES HANDS
AT AN AUCTION SALE**
