

**J. P. ELECTION MAY START HOT LITTLE CONTEST**

Republicans Want a Primary In Precinct 12 to Nominate a Candidate. Democratic Committee Meets Tonight.

There are the makings of a hot little political scrap in Precinct 12, Albuquerque, in connection with the election for justice of the peace and constable next month. Republicans are to hold primaries in the precinct and a meeting of the Democratic city committee will be held tonight to determine whether or not a primary will be held.

Judge W. W. McClellan, whose tenure of the judgeship in Precinct 12 has been so long that it extends behind the memory of the oldest citizen, is again a candidate. There is a tradition in the precinct that McClellan cannot be beaten; and that a jinx lies itself to any man who tries it. But there are at least two men who believe they can beat the Judge this time and one of them is Dennis McDonald, a Democrat. The other is J. Benson Newell, a Republican, who has run for the office a sufficient number of times to gain prestige as a perpetual candidate. Newell announced himself for the job. There are indications that the Republican party organization in the precinct does not like kindly to the announcement and that plans are under way to ditch the young attorney. In fact it is said that another candidate is ready to make the race in the primary. Former state Senator P. Hanley is mentioned in this connection, whether with or without his consent is not known.

In Precinct 26, where Judge George H. Craig will be a candidate again, an effort will be made to make a fight against him, but it is not believed it will meet with success. Craig's satisfactory service in the city court has added each year to his personal popularity and the combination makes him a hard man to beat.

**AMMONS SAYS SITUATION IS NOW UNDER CONTROL**

Colorado Governor Tells President Wilson Federal Troops May Be Withdrawn as Soon As He Returns Home.

**BOOZE EMBARGO AT TRINIDAD LIFTED**

Government Ban on Liquor Shipments in Force Since April to Be Raised on First of January.

Washington, Dec. 22.—Arrangements for beginning the withdrawal of federal troops from the Colorado strike districts within the next ten days were made today at a conference between President Wilson, Governor Ammons of Colorado, Governor-elect Carlson and Senator Shafroth.

After seeing the president the Colorado officials discussed details with Secretary Garrison.

Governor Ammons told the president that if the plan of withdrawing the troops from one district at a time were carried out he would be able to control the situation with local officials. He said he could use the military if necessary, but desired to avoid further expense to the state. He declared there was every prospect of peace if the local authorities were given an opportunity to gain control of the situation gradually. He told the president he would leave for Trinidad tomorrow and was willing that the first troops be withdrawn as soon as he arrived.

Governor Ammons advised that Seth Low and the other members of the president's Colorado strike commission be not sent into the state for the present and said that the investigation carried on by the federal industrial relations commission had postponed the settlement of the strike at least two weeks. He estimated that all the troops can be got ten out within ten days after the first movement is begun.

**Booze Embargo Raised.**  
Trinidad, Colo., Dec. 22.—Col. S. J. Lockell, commander of the federal troops in the southern Colorado strike district, has announced that beginning on January 1st, upon the expiration of the last proclamation of Governor Ammons, the federal will impose no more restrictions on the sale or shipment of liquor in the district.

The saloons throughout Las Animas and Huerfano counties have been closed since April 23. The places were first closed here by the order of the mayor and upon the arrival of the federal troops the prohibition was continued. The last proclamation of the governor was issued on November 26 to cover a period of thirty-one days.

**Strike Testimony Contradictory.**  
Canon City, Colo., Dec. 22.—Direct contradiction of testimony by which the state sought to prove that the attack upon the Chandler mine on April 25 and 26, 1914, was the result of a conspiracy by the United Mine Workers of America was made today in the trial of seven striking coal miners charged with the murder of William King, killed in the Chandler fight. Early in the trial Albert Seip, formerly an officer of the Florence local of the union, testified for the state. He told of a special meeting of the union on April 24, at which he claimed a resolution to attack the Chandler mine was adopted.

Today the defense put on the stand Ed Spaulding, William McMillan, John Horn and Tony Djalamb, members of the miners' union, and they testified that the resolution to attack Chandler was offered by Seip himself and rejected by the union. The witnesses said they thought the meeting was called for the purpose of organizing an armed company for defense, and not to decide upon any aggressive action.

**MANY PRIZES SENT OUT IN ESSAY CONTEST**

Number of Ribbons Called for Indicates Great Success of Disease-Preventing Week in Schools.

Prize badges to the number of 299 have been sent to schools in different parts of the state by the New Mexico Society for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis in connection with the essay contest recently held.

R. W. Wiley said today that the call for prizes from county superintendents brought out the fact that the contest aroused interest throughout the state. Teachers and county superintendents all over New Mexico were enthusiastic over the disease-prevention week, and the contest, Mr. Wiley said, undoubtedly did much good.

Essays by pupils of Bernalillo county schools have been turned in but the winners have not yet been announced.

The best essays in the state will win gold, silver and bronze medals. The state winners are not likely to be made known for a month.

**MAY START A NEW SANITARIUM IN THIS CITY**

Railroad Man Planning an Institution That Will Be Launched With 25 Cottages for a Beginning.

Another sanitarium of the type particularly approved by the Commercial club and other leaders of development in this city may be established here shortly. W. M. Wood, traveling passenger agent of the Louisville & Nashville railroad, has opened correspondence with the Commercial club in search of information regarding the cost of constructing an institution.

Mr. Wood announces that it is his intention to erect a sanitarium "somewhere." He reserves positive declaration as to a choice of site, but his letter indicates that he is deeply interested in Albuquerque, and the club will spare no effort to present this city to him in its best light.

Mr. Wood writes that his plan will be to start with the erection of 25 cottages similar to the ones at the Methodist sanitarium. He has decided on all the details of interior work and furnishings, but is desirous of getting an estimate on the cost of construction.

The 25 cottages will be only a beginning, according to Mr. Wood's plans. His idea is to expand the institution as rapidly as development can be brought about. He has made up his mind, he writes, that the sanitarium will start clear of debt, and for that reason he has limited him-
