

Governor McDonald Makes Brief Comment

people who are entitled to our best consideration.

House Bill No. 198 is a compromise in regard to the teaching of Spanish in our schools. As provided by this bill much or little may be accomplished, depending upon the attitude of the various school directors and boards of education.

House Bill No. 199 is what the title indicates, for the purpose of training teachers for rural districts. This bill is, in my opinion, worthy and commendable and will have a beneficial effect upon the development of our school interests. It provides an appropriation for paying the expenses of those who would become teachers for attendance at our normal schools.

House Bill No. 177 provides for the auditing of the accounts of municipal corporations and for publishing a synopsis of the report of such audit. This is, in my opinion, a very important bill, but its benefits will depend upon the enforcement of the law and the interest the people may take in the management of their own affairs as related to local government.

House Bill No. 434 provides for military training of students in our state educational and high schools. This law is not mandatory but simply directory, and enables the various schools to have military training if they so desire.

House Bill No. 1 is for the purpose of fulfilling a campaign pledge. I presume, but seems to have failed to accomplish that result. This bill, as originally drafted, was somewhat known as the road tax. As it is now it abolishes nothing but does away with what was understood to have been an objectionable feature of road tax collection.

House Bill No. 264 seems to be a little irregular, but as it provides for paying what seemed to me to be a just obligation of the state, I decided to sign it.

In the prosecution of what is known as the boundary suit between Texas and New Mexico a deficiency had been created by the expenses attendant upon such suit, and it seemed to me only proper and just that provision should be made for the payment of these expenses honestly and in good faith incurred.

House Bill No. 196 is an appropriation to pay part of the expenses of the reproduction of the San Diego exposition building in the city of Santa Fe.

This bill provides that the state shall expend as much as \$50,000 for building a counterpart of the San Diego building in the city of Santa Fe, no part of such appropriation to be available until a proper site has been furnished free of cost and at least \$25,000 raised from other sources to be applied the same as the appropriation made by the state. This seemed to me a very good investment for the state, as in addition to its own expenditure it would receive from other sources more than the amount appropriated and create something that would not only be of importance to the city of Santa Fe but a credit and an asset to the whole state.

House Bill No. 231 is really a premium and reward to be paid to the various volunteer fire companies throughout the state. This appropriation is made from the insurance fund of the state, which, as I understand, is not otherwise available for the use of the state at the present time, except for the purpose of paying some deficiencies.

House Bill No. 487 relates to appeals from peace courts. This simply elaborates the procedure in the higher courts and makes it more definite, which is a benefit to the litigant.

House Bill No. 269 is for the purpose of providing a better method of cooperation between irrigation districts and the federal authorities, and its passage, as I understand, is carried out, will be advantageous to the localities where the reclamation service of the federal government has become interested in irrigation projects.

House Bill No. 319 is known as the flag bill, and under the circumstances I do not care to mention it any further.

House Bill No. 124 provides for the registration, etc., of pedlered stock and is for the purpose of protecting and improving our livestock interests.

House Bill No. 144 provides for the care of orphans under certain conditions and restrictions. The state has no institution for the care of such unfortunate, and as far as this bill goes I believe that it is a just and worthy one.

House Bill No. 163 is for the purpose of establishing a highway from Cimarron by way of Taos to Santa Fe. Such bills simply put the highways on the map.

House Bill No. 241 is known as the banking bill. This is a very important bill but time alone will determine whether it meets the requirements. Its purpose is to safeguard and protect both the interests of investors and depositors.

The restrictions and requirements are much more definite and distinct than anything we ever had before. Some features of this bill seem to be objectionable, but in the main they are far more than offset by the improved banking conditions that will be obtained by the proper administration and enforcement of this law.

House Bill No. 262 is intended for the better protection of game and for increasing the restrictions in regard to the killing of game and game birds.

This bill also rearranges and increases the compensation for officers in charge of this department, which I believe to be only just and fair.

House Bill No. 309 is intended for the prevention and elimination of hog cholera. The bill is entirely meritorious but seems to me to have failed to provide for proper administration.

House Bill No. 258 is known as the deficiency appropriation bill. I discussed this bill in a veto message and it was afterwards passed over my

BROWN WILL OPEN FORTY COMPANIES SEEK CONTRACT FOR BOOKS

Successful Manager of Valmor Ranch Sanitarium Takes Over Big Property in Gallinas Canyon Near Las Vegas.

East Las Vegas, N. M., March 23.—The Montezuma hotel in Gallinas canyon, with the considerable tract of land surrounding it, is once more to be made into a health resort, this time upon a basis which seems to promise success for the undertaking which has failed so often in the past.

Built many years ago as a resort for tourists by the Santa Fe railroad, successive efforts by the railroad company to operate the huge hotel even on a cost basis, failed, and finally after numerous efforts to dispose of it the property was given to the Las Vegas Y. M. C. A. by the railroad.

Dr. W. T. Brown, the successful manager of the Valmor ranch resort near Watrous, Mora county, has entered into a contract with the Y. M. C. A., through the Commercial club, as intermediary, to take over the plant at once and to have it open and running by the beginning of the summer.

Dr. Brown has gone to Chicago where he expects to float a limited issue of stock which is necessary to complete financing the deal, and will receive from him since his arrival indicates that he is now assured of success. The Montezuma hotel, one of the largest hotel buildings in the west, is to be transformed into a first class sanitarium; its grounds improved and its mineral springs made available. The success of Dr. Brown in handling the difficult proposition at Valmor gives every reason for expecting that a right man has been found to handle the Montezuma property.

HOWELL ERNEST TO BE SECRETARY TO COMMISSION

Will Serve Without Pay Until Status of Traveling Auditor's Office Is Finally Settled—Then Will Receive Compensation.

Santa Fe, N. M., March 23.—Before leaving for their homes yesterday afternoon Chairman John W. Poon, of the state tax commission and Commissioner Ulrich of Carrizosa let it be known that the commission had determined to retain Traveling Auditor Howell Ernest permanently as secretary of the commission, and its active man in charge. Pending the settlement of the status of the traveling auditor's office, Mr. Ernest will draw no pay as secretary of the tax commission, but after the traveling auditorship matter has been straightened out, which it is expected will be done April first or shortly after, Mr. Ernest's compensation as secretary of the tax commission will be decided. The commission meets again April 20th when it will make the final planing of values on corporate property for the year's assessment purposes.

The position of the traveling auditor's job today is problematical. Nominally Mr. Ernest is traveling auditor, although the office has been abolished under House Bill No. 294. In discussing that bill and the appropriation bill yesterday the governor made it plain that he understood the whole salary appropriation for the office to have been terminated when he struck it out of the general appropriation bill. The attorney general, however, has stated in a brief opinion that he thinks the provision for amount of salary to be paid, in House Bill No. 294, is sufficient to provide for the payment, it having been the intent of the legislature that such payment be made. The whole matter, it now seems likely, will wind up in the state supreme court.

veto; therefore I will leave it to the public to determine as to its merits and the justification of the veto. If the taxpayers believe in expending money in this manner and it is satisfactory to them, it is their right while to raise any further objection as to whether this appropriation provides for the expenditure of public funds for such purposes as may be beneficial to the state.

House Bill No. 295 makes it a misdemeanor for anyone to appropriate an automobile, bicycle or motorcycle to his own use that belongs to another. The objection to this bill really is that instead of a misdemeanor it should be a felony.

House Bill No. 62 provides for the distribution of automobile tax, giving one-half to the state and one-half to the county in which such tax originates. Heretofore all of the tax has gone to the state for the improvement of public highways.

House Bill No. 282 is the mine tax bill, which was discussed by me yesterday. There is unquestionable merit as well as serious objections to it.

ALFALFA MEAL MILL TO BE OPERATED ON THE MAXWELL TRACT

Maxwell, N. M., March 23.—Machinery has been ordered by R. K. Peiphrey and others, for alfalfa meal, which it is expected to operate during the coming summer and fall. The mill ordered has a capacity of five tons a day and is thought sufficiently large for immediate requirements. While considerable alfalfa has been shipped out of Maxwell in the past, it is believed that a better profit can be had through reduction of at least a part of the crop. It is expected that the new mill will run full time for a part of the coming season and will be on part time operation during the rest.

Gallup Undertakes to Organize Guard

Gallup, N. M., March 23.—Active effort has been started here for the organization of a national guard company in order that Gallup may have the advantages of Senate Bill No. 119, providing for the erection of a national guard armory here and appropriating \$12,500 for the purpose, through an issue of bonds.

The provisions of the act require that a company of the national guard properly organized and accepted by the state and war department, be in working order before an armory can be constructed. In the past it has been impossible to recruit, much less to maintain a guard company here, because of some prejudice existing against the militia. It is believed, however, that under the special conditions existing the company will be formed.

Supreme Court Orders New Trial in the Anderson Murder Case

Santa Fe, N. M., March 23.—The supreme court today handed down the following opinion: State of New Mexico, appellee, vs. Carin Vasquez, appellant, No. 529, Quay county.

Appellant was indicted by a grand jury of the county of Quay, state of New Mexico, charged with the murder of one Dudley Anderson. A trial resulted in a verdict of guilty of murder in the first degree, from which verdict and judgment of the district court this appeal is set out.

To warrant the killing of another in self defense the danger and necessity must have been real, or so manifestly apparent as to create a reasonable belief of present peril to life of limb.

Opinion by Chief Justice Roberts, Justice Hanna and Justice Parker concurring.
