CAMPAIGN TO GET DEMURRER FILED IN LIBERTY BELL IS OPENED THE TRAVELING AUDITOR SUIT

Deming Editor Proposes Scheme to Have Famous Relic Sent to Coast Exposition Over Southwestern Route.

E. R. Vallandingham, editor of a Deming paper, has proposed a scheme to give the people of the southwest a chance to see the Liberty Bell as it is taken to the coast for exhibition at one of the expositions. Mr. Vallandingham, having the interests of Deming at heart, suggests that the bell be sent through that city in a telegram to the select council of Philadelphia and naively urges all New Mexico editors to back the project and send similar telegrams.

The bell is to be started on its western trip some time after July 4. Plans for its journey have not been made definitely as regards routing. In time to have the bell started through the southwest Mr. Vallandingham hopes to develop a "campaign of such proportions that Philadelphia would accept seriously and probably with favor the request of the southwest for the Liberty Bell."

The telegram sent by the Deming man was as follows:

Deming, N. M., April 17, 1915. The Honorable, The Select Council of Philadelphia, Philadelphia, Pa. On behalf of the people of the great southwest, I most respectfully urge that in its journey across the continent to the Panama-Pacific International exposition at San Francisco, the Liberty Bell be routed through the southwest via El Paso, Deming and Tucson. Hundreds of thousands of loyal Americans in Texas, New Mexico and Arizona will give guarantees that your sacred trust as custodians of the Liberty Bell may be safely reposed in them.

Attorney General Sets Up That Complaint Leaves Out Only Possible Cause of Action in the Official Mixup.

Santa Fe, N. M., April 22.—Attorney General Frank W. Clancy today filed a demurrer to the petition for an injunction, filed yesterday before Judge Mechem, in which Attorneys E. C. Wade, Jr., and J. H. Crist sought to restrain the state auditor from issuing warrants on the state treasury in payment of the salaries of the recently appointed traveling auditor, A. G. Whittier, and his assistants. The attorney general sets up that the complaint is without standing in court in that it fails to advance what the defense considers the only possible ground of action, viz., the legislative record.

LAS VEGAS PLANS TO ENTERTAIN OLD SOLDIERS

East Las Vegas, N. M., April 22.—A committee from the New Mexico department of the Grand Army of the Republic met yesterday with Dr. Frank H. H. Roberts, president of the New Mexico Normal university, to discuss plans for the entertainment of the soldiers of the department on the occasion of the annual encampment here on April 27. A banquet, to be served at the state school, and the program in celebration of the birthdays of Washington, Lincoln and Grant, were the chief matters discussed.

Captain John Ross, commander of the New Mexico department, Dr. P. E. Olney, assistant adjutant and quartermaster general of the body, and Captain John Brunton, past commander of the department, represented the soldiers.

The Normal is making elaborate plans for the celebration. Numbers of flags have been purchased for the occasion. A large American flag, six feet by 12 in dimensions, has been bought to replace the old banner now in the possession of the school.

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WILLIAMS BACK IN HIGH HOPES ONCE MORE

Corporation Commissioner says the Interstate Commerce Commission Assured Him it Would Decide New Mexico Rate Case in May.

Santa Fe, N. M., April 22.—Corporation Commissioner Hugh H. Williams returned home today from Washington flushed with high hopes and almost confident that the interstate commerce commission soon will give a decision in the New Mexico rate case, presented at Albuquerque two years ago, and since pending before the commission. Mr. Williams says members of the commission told him the New Mexico case would be taken up and considered in May and that a decision might be expected then.

The hopes of the commissioners have been worked up to a high pitch several times in the past.

CORDIAL WELCOME TO THE CITY FOR LODGEMEN

Special Trainload of Delegates to B'nai B'rith Convention Greeted and Entertained by Albuquerqueans.

Welcomed by a delegation of local members of the order, a trainload of delegates to the grand lodge of the Independent Order of B'nai B'rith arrived in the city this afternoon. They are on their way from the east to San Francisco, where the grand lodge will meet.

The train bore about 100 delegates. It arrived at 3 o'clock, and for four hours the party were the guests of Albuquerqueans.

Adolph Kraus of Chicago, the president of the grand lodge, was among the visitors, and other distinguished men made the party a noteworthy one.

They were welcomed at the station by a delegation headed by the following official reception committee from the local B'nai B'rith: Dr. J. S. Cline, president; Vice President, Rosenberger; W. H. Copeland, secretary and treasurer; County Treasurer, M. Mandell, past president; Julius Mandell, inner guard; Marcus Cline, outer guard.

The visitors were given a ride about the city, viewing the university, the Commercial club, Baras bridge, Indian school, the old church in Old Town and other sights.

There is to be a meeting at Temple Albert, at which addresses are expected from distinguished members of the party, and that will be followed by a reception at the Woman's club. The train is due to leave at 7 o'clock.

Hebrews distinguished in their walks in life are numbered among the delegates. Adolph Kraus, the president of the grand lodge, is a member of the board of education of the city of Chicago, and has served two terms as president of that body. He was formerly corporation counsel of Chicago, was the second president of the United States civil service commission and at one time was editor and proprietor of the Chicago Times.

Among the other distinguished members of the party are Simon Wolf, the noted jurist, author and scholar, who is known throughout the country as one of the most liberal of philanthropists and who served as consul general to Egypt under the administration of President Hayes; Jacob Hilkopf, superintendent of the Jewish Educational Institute of Kansas City; Rabbi Isidore Rosenthal of Lancaster, Penn.; Rabbi David Alexander of Toledo, O.; Rabbi Joseph Bernstein, of St. Joseph, Mo.; Ernest Bernstein, former mayor of Shreveport, La., and one of the most prominent Jews in the south; Mr. and Mrs. Harry Outler, wealthy philanthropists of Providence, R. I., and Mr. and Mrs. Martin A. Marks, of Cleveland.

EIGHT CRIMINALS PLEAD GUILTY IN COURT TODAY

They Will be Sentenced Later. Arriga and Dempwolf Arr Among Those Who Deny Charges Against Them.

Prisoners indicted by the last grand jury were arraigned before Judge Reynolds in the district court today. The following pleaded guilty: Julian Justus, forgery; Dario Garcia, larceny of heat cattle; Jose Santos Martinez, assault with intent to kill; Leandro Armenta, wife abandonment, assault with intent to kill; E. Murphy, etc., forgery; Jose Contreras, robbery while armed, and robbery.

They will be arraigned for sentence later in the term. Camillo Arriga, charged with murdering Cipriano Viera, pleaded not guilty. So did Theodore J. Dempwolf, brought back from Illinois to answer to a charge of kidnapping his baby from his divorced wife. Others who pleaded not guilty were Angel Hernandez, Urbino Sanchez, Francisco Alire, and Perillo Saveria.

The law firm of Simms & Simms, of which Democratic County Chairman John Simms is a member, was appointed to defend Arriga.

The Seb damage case was still on this afternoon. The criminal docket is to be called tomorrow, and if the Seb case is out of the way the trial of Arriga for murder will be put on.
