**FINAL DRIVE ON THE NIGHT TICKETS UNDER WAY TODAY**

Several Hundred Added to Rapidly Mounting Total Today and Workers Are Sure Goal Will Be Reached Tomorrow.

**ATTENDANCE OUTLOOK IS GROWING DAILY**

Detail Work of Special Train Operation Now Well Under Way and Record Breaking Tour Parties Are Certain.

The final drive for the sale of two thousand night season tickets for the fair began this morning, with every prospect that the next two days will see the successful end of the campaign. President Putney, of the state fair commission, Secretary Egan of the Commercial club, and a number of other workers, whose efforts were on the streets early and at noon reported a most gratifying sale. Secretary Wiley has received a number of orders from outside the city for the night season tickets, and the success of the advance sale is assured.

The details of the Albuquerque Automobile Racing association to give an auto show on the grounds instead of a road race as had originally been planned is one of the interesting developments of the state fair program during the last few days. Colonel E. B. Sellers, whose experiment in putting on an auto show in this city winter before last was so eminently satisfactory, is taking an active interest in the show to be held at the fair, and this in itself is sufficient to assure the success of the enterprise. Associated with Colonel Sellers are a number of local auto enthusiasts who are giving freely of their time and money to make the movement a success.

That the crowds at this year's fair will break all records is becoming increasingly apparent day by day. Letters are pouring in upon Secretary Wiley from all parts of the state asking for information regarding hotel accommodations, and the entire time of one stenographer is required to keep up with this correspondence alone. The number of people who will come from outside the city and friends and relatives in this city can not be estimated, but it is known that these will amount to several hundred.

Every railroad in New Mexico, with the single exception of the Southern Pacific, which traverses only a very small section of our state, has granted extremely low rates for the fair, and it is likely that the Southern Pacific will also come into line in a few days. The Santa Fe, the El Paso and Southwestern and the New Mexico Central have all made a rate of one fare for the round trip, while the Colorado and Southern has made a rate of one and a third fare for the round trip, thus assuring a big attendance at the fair from Clayton and other northeastern New Mexico points.

Secretary Wiley has under way with the people of San Juan county the matter of running a special excursion train to Albuquerque from Farmington and intermediate points for the fair. A representative of the Santa Fe railroad is now in San Juan county working up the details of the excursion, and it is expected that a delegation of several hundred will come on this train.

**HEAD OF FAMOUS OREGON HOSPITAL A VISITOR**

Dr. R. C. Matson, Director of Woods Hutchinson Sanitarium Will Address County Medical Society Tonight.

Dr. and Mrs. R. C. Matson of Portland, Ore., Dr. M. Hendricks and Dr. Hugh Croose of El Paso arrived in Albuquerque last night from Las Vegas where they have been attending the annual meeting of the New Mexico Medical society, and tonight will be the guests of the Bernalillo County Medical society at a special meeting to be held at 8 o'clock at the Albuquerque sanitarium. Dr. Matson is the superintendent of the famous Oregon sanitarium, established by Dr. Woods Hutchinson, and succeeded by Dr. Hutchinson in the management of the institution. Dr. Hendricks is superintendent of the Hendricks sanitarium of El Paso, while Dr. Croose is one of the best known surgeons in the southwest. The visitors were entertained during the day by Dr. A. G. Shortle and other Albuquerque physicians who showed them over the city in automobiles.

**TAOS COMMISSION TAKES FORMAL FAIR ACTION**

Special Meeting at Taos on Monday and Space Contract Forwarded.

Final assurance of a splendid exhibit of the resources of Taos county at the state fair was received at four headquarters today when P. V. Hirschman, chairman of the Taos county board, forwarded to secretary R. W. Wiley the county's contract for space, at the same time advising that the commissioners at a special meeting in Taos on Monday had made the appropriation necessary to carry through the exhibit, as promised to the fair workers, Messrs. Sellers and Honina, during their visit to Taos last week. The working committees for the Taos display were appointed while the fair workers were in Taos and the assurance that the commission would finance the display was made at that time. A meeting of the county board would not be held, however, because two of the commissioners could not get to Taos in time for a meeting.

A. A. Rivera, the county clerk, was made chairman of the arrangements committee, with Fred Lewis as secretary, and P. W. Dickinson, chairman of the county board, William McKeen and Jose Montaner were named a committee to district the county and gather the exhibits. This committee has arranged to assemble the exhibit at Taos and display parts of it in the court house during the fair. The county board will meet on September 23 and 25, after which it will be packed for shipment to Albuquerque.

**OWNERS SHOULD COMBINE TO STOP SCORCHING**

Self-Interest Says Col. Sellers, Demands That They Attack Evil of Reckless Driving; Roads Good.

Auto owners themselves should combine to suppress the scorching menace of motor travel, roads in and near the city, says Colonel D. K. R. Sellers. Reckless driving in the residence section has become an unmitigated nuisance that cannot be blinked, the colonel said. Going up Fourth street, reckless drivers speed up to sixty miles an hour. Dogs and chickens suffer.

The auto owners themselves can do more to do away with the reckless driver than any other agency. By organization and cooperative effort they can stamp out the scorching menace. However, the colonel pointed out, it behooves the autoists to act for self-protection. If they ignore or remain indifferent to the situation the first thing they know there will be an unreasonable law on state or municipal books. The autoists should combine, he pointed out, for mutual protection—protection for the people who have hitherto been forced to put up with reckless driving and protection of the reasonable autoist against oppressive laws.

 Colonel Sellers reports that all the roads leading into and out of the city are in the best shape they have been for twelve months. There is neither sand nor mud to vex the driver. Now that it is reasonable to expect that the rainy season is over, all tourists can feel free to come and go over every section of the route leading in and out of town.
