BIG DEALS LAST WEEK IN BOSTON WOOL MARKET

Between Six and Seven Million Pounds, Including Five Million of Territory, Reported Sold.

The Boston Commercial Bulletin, reviewing last week's market for wool says in part:

With the foreign markets decidedly on the upward trend and manufacturers here showing much more interest in raw material, it has been somewhat surprising to find that the Boston wool market does not present a uniformly firm front but the fact is that while the vast majority believe more than ever in the value of wool, there are those who are still skeptical, not only about the future strength of the market but also concerning the present soundness of the market. However, the vast majority are unquestionably optimistic at the moment, and a decline does not seem to be sound reasoning for their belief.

Certainly the transfers of wool during the past week have been large enough and of such nature to inspire some confidence in the future market. Well over an average week's business has been put through, probably between six and seven million pounds, since our last report. Apparently the largest corporations have concluded that it is about time to take some wool in a much larger way than they have for some months. Moreover, it appears that the operations have not been confined to Boston only, although it is likely that the bulk of the wool purchased this week by New England corporations has been taken in this market.

Prices appear to have reached a fairly uniform basis for the present.

notwithstanding a few sales seem to have been made at rather "soft" prices. There has also been a diversified demand, as well as a fairly general one. Woolen mill classes have sold very well out the worsted interests have been the chief operators, including some spinners as well as the larger operators who run from top to cloth.

Primary Markets Still Climbing.
The foreign primary markets, especially those in Australia, have been climbing upward again this week, and one is constrained to wonder where the end will be. Apparently it hasn't been reached yet. At the opening day of the sale in Melbourne, prices on crossbreds were very dear, an advance of 5 to 7 1/2 per cent, as compared with the previous sale being called on the opening day, Monday. The price of 21 1/2 was paid for a choice lot, an estimated clean landed cost here of about 79 cents. For 50's grade, the estimated clean cost for the best wools was about 68 cents.

Offerings of merinos in Melbourne this week, as well as at Sydney, have been rather poor generally. In the latter market, however, some wools have been known to command the premium which has been prevalent lately. Top-making sorts have realized as high as 15 1/2, or about 68 to 69 cents, clean landed basis, while average combing wools have brought 70 to 72 cents and warp wools, which are very limited, are available at 73 to 75 cents.

American orders in Australia have been fairly numerous and in not a few instances orders were without limit early in the week, although some buyers began to distrust the wisdom of this policy after the first day or two or sales.

The market in New Zealand has also been climbing in sympathy with the other world's markets for crossbred wools. How much wool has been purchased here to date, however, has not been known with any assurance. The total trading thus far being on the sheep's backs. The first sale occurs in Christ Church a week from next Thursday, November 11th.

In South America, the market has been strengthening and quotations there at the moment are 28 to 40 cents for the best packed Lincolns, 40 to 41 cents for average quarter, and 42 cents for high quality Argentine wools. A very large percentage of the so-called "super" wools—possibly 75 per cent—is reported to have been taken in South America this year.

France and Italy have been buying actively into competition with the United States this season. This is not unexpected in view of the practical impossibility for these two countries to get the short, defective wools which they have been accustomed to buy at the River Plate, Caribbean and Combed, as they formerly did in Belgium, and so they have gone in for free wools of good staple.

It is reported that two or three thousand bales of wool have been purchased in South Africa already for the American market, although offerings being made at the moment are hardly more than nominal, and on about the same landed basis, clean, as that quoted last week, twelve months wool varying from about 54 to 55 cents up to 62 cents for the choicest clip.

Territory Wool.
The demand for territory wools has increased this week very decidedly. Just how much wool has been sold is not certain. Some think over five million pounds has been taken by a leading mill but this quantity seems excessive, and it seems improbable that more than this amount of territory wool has changed hands all told. There has been a rather steady call on the part of one or two mills for staple fine and half-blood combing wool, the best of which have been sold at about 79 cents for the half-blood and 71-72 cents for the fine staple. Ordinary fine staple territory wools have been

selling at about 26 cents and half-blood at 28 cents. The principal sales of the week seem to have been in half-blood and fine medium wools both graded and original, on the basis of 47 1/2 to cents depending upon the wool. Fine and fine medium Soda Springs and Utah wools have sold respectively at 24 and 23 cents in the grease, while half-blood Soda Springs and Wyoming wools have been sold, respectively, at 26 and 26 cents and some Idaho at 27 cents.

Sales of quarter, three-eighths and braid wools are reported in a limited way at 34 1/2 cents, 23 1/2 cents and 22 1/2 cents, respectively. Original New Mexican wools have sold at 21 1/2 to 24 1/2 cents, respectively. Several fair-sized sales of Texas twelve months wool are reported in the range of 26 to 27 cents, of 43 to 45 cents, clean basis. Some 200,000 to 400,000 pounds are reported sold for the week. California wools in the grease have been slow of sale but some business has been done in secured wools, a very fair quantity having been transferred at 55 to 57 cents.

There has been a fair trade in secured wool this week, more especially in foreign secured wools, including a considerable quantity of Australian and Capes of very good condition at 58 to 60 cents. Some of the best Australians have brought as high as 65 cents for very choice wool. Fine territories are variously quoted at 63 to 65 cents for No. 1 New Mexican and up to 68 to 69 cents for best fine territory.

There has been a good demand for grey wools in the range of 43 to 45 cents. Some Eastern B. supers have been sold at 60 to 62 cents and Western at about 55 to 57 cents. Secured California has been sold freely at 55 to 57 cents.

STATE LAND OFFICE BREAKS ITS RECORD FOR FEES RECEIVED

Santa Fe, N. M., Nov. 1.—The state land office exceeded all previous monthly records for fees remitted the state by over \$100,000 today when Commissioner Ervin furnished the state treasurer with \$234,455.97, proceeds of lease and sale of state lands for October. The highest previous record was \$127,795.66, last October. Of today's remittance, \$187,318.12 is from leases and \$47,127.84 from sales.

The state treasurer today received from the United States treasury at Washington \$41,938.39, the state's share of national forest receipts in the state for the last fiscal year. Fees were also received from the corporation commission of \$226.30 in corporation fees and \$209.79 insurance fees.

CERILLOS SCHOOLS TO HAVE READING ROOM

Cerillos, N. M., Nov. 1.—A reading room in connection with the public school here will be opened Friday night at a meeting to be attended by the county school superintendent and a number of prominent people. At the same time a mothers' club is to be organized. Mrs. W. C. McDonald, wife of the governor, Mrs. R. P. Asplund of Santa Fe and a number of others are expected to attend.

STUBBS VISITING HIS CATTLE RANCH IN EDDY COUNTY

Carlsbad, N. M., Oct. 31.—Former Governor W. R. Stubbs of Kansas is spending several days here looking after his cattle business in Eddy county. His company has just sold 1,500 black babies to H. Perlinger of Fort Worth, Texas. It is the very best stock and brought a good price. Governor Stubbs is heavily interested in stock. He owns a large ranch east of Higford, Texas, another in Colorado and a fine dairy herd near Mulvane, Kansas, which supplies milk to the condensation at that point.

H. H. Geisler, for a number of years in charge of the farm of the Carlsbad Orchard and Plantation company below Carlsbad, has resigned his position and gone on to Denver. Mr. Geisler is yet undecided as to his future course.

NOVEMBER 21 WILL BE EDUCATIONAL DAY IN STATE

Churches Throughout New Mexico Asked to Observe Day, Which Will Be Marked Here by Big Gathering.

Sunday, November 21, has been designated as Educational Sunday in New Mexico, and Hon. Alvan N. White, state superintendent of education, has sent out a circular to all teachers and churches throughout the state asking that the day be observed in the churches in connection with the great gathering of teachers in this city, to begin the final campaign against illiteracy in New Mexico.

A majority of the teachers who will attend the educational convention will be in Albuquerque by Sunday afternoon and it is proposed to hold a big Sunday service here as the teachers' observance of Educational Sunday. Mr. White continues to urge attendance at the teacher's convention and in a supplemental circular just issued asks county school directors wherever possible to pay the expenses of teachers.

He says in this circular:

"Wherever the funds of the district permit, the expenses of the teacher should be paid wholly or in part from such funds. I recommend the payment of at least the railroad fare. It is a legitimate and proper expenditure—really an investment—as your teachers will thus be able to gain inspiration and practical suggestions for their work in your schools. It is largely due to the fact that so many teachers and school officers have met in these annual gatherings that New Mexico is making such rapid strides educationally in every part of the state. Let us 'get together' for a still stronger campaign for better schools."

TENDERS MERSFELDER SUPERVISORSHIP OF INDUSTRIAL EDUCATION

Santa Fe, N. M., Nov. 1.—State Superintendent Alvan N. White has offered the position of superintendent of the department of industrial education to E. S. Mersfelder at Clovis. Mr. Mersfelder until recently was county school superintendent of Curry county. He is one of the best known teachers in the state. The position is to be made vacant December 1st, when according to a recent announcement, Miss Mamie A. Myers, the present superintendent, will resign. Miss Myers is to be married shortly after that date.

NO CONSCRIPTION IN AUSTRALIA UNTIL THE PEOPLE VOTE ON IT

Associated Press Correspondent Melbourne, Australia, Oct. 31.—When a delegation representing the Trades Hall Council of Melbourne waited upon Premier Fisher a week ago and asked him for a pronouncement as to the attitude of the government toward conscription, Mr. Fisher declared that conscription would not be introduced in Australia unless the people of the commonwealth were given an opportunity of voting upon the question. He added that the government had no intention of bringing in a bill dealing with conscription, and for himself he was opposed to it.

Throughout the hearing Mr. Fisher showed great impatience over the whole subject of conscription. He said: "So far as the government is concerned it stands exactly as it has always stood. It is pledged under the defense act to raise our own men for service for the defense of the dominion."

When a number of the delegation suggested that the allies of Great Britain might be providing her in conscription army into the field to be repaid with some heat, "They would not be allowed any such impertinence."

MEN ALSO TO AID IN KEEPING MORALS OF JAPAN CLEAN

Tokio, Oct. 31.—The Japan Christian Party, of which the Rev. Dr. President Sakuro Shimoda, president of the house of representatives, will help the movement for a "moral Kyoto" during the coronation period inaugurated recently by the Japanese Emperor's coronation. The Salvation Army has also joined.

The object is to exclude "girls" or dancing girls from all public functions to be held during the period of coronation, and to urge the authorities to exercise strict control over numbers detrimental to public morality.

In this connection the party society will publish the names of sixty representative men in and out of government life favoring the program of the reformers. A pamphlet will be distributed to the officials of the government, the members of each house of the diet, the press throughout the country and other representative persons. Mr. Shimoda himself will lead the movement and will try to secure the support of Premier Count Okuma and the authorities of the departments of home affairs and education.


