C. Schmidt Captured, Another of Outlaws Killed and Third Wounded and Again Under Detention.

PRESIDENT FILES FIRST PRESIDENTIAL AFFIDAVIT IN IOWA

(By Evening Herald Special Wire) Des Moines, Iowa, Feb. 21.—President Wilson today filed an affidavit with W. S. Allen, secretary of state, as candidate for president in the preference primary to be held in Iowa April 27.
