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ARMIES ON EASTERN FRONT FROM DANUBE TO THE BLACK SEA ARE IN A DEADLOCK

Latest Reports Show a Lessening in the Intensity of the Struggle between Central Powers and Russia and Rumania.

VON MACKENSEN FAILS TO PIERCE THE LINES

Petrograd Declares No Events of Importance Have Occurred Along Slav or Caucasus Fronts; Weather Bad for Fighting.

(By Evening Herald Special Wire.) Latest reports from the Russian frontiers of the Danube indicate a lessening in the intensity of the struggle between the invading armies of the central powers and the Russian and Rumanian forces.

Field Marshal von Mackensen's final attempt to break the allied lines between the Danube and the Black Sea has failed. The German general's offensive, which began on the night of the 20th, has been repulsed. The Russian forces, under the command of General Brusilov, have held their ground and have inflicted heavy losses on the German army.

In their invasion of Transylvania, the Rumanians report success in an attack at Hermeziu, where 500 men and five machine guns were captured. Nearly 5,000 prisoners have been taken by the Rumanians so far in their Transylvanian campaign.

Today's official statement from Petrograd declares no events of importance have occurred along the Russian or Caucasus fronts. It is probable, however, that adverse weather conditions are making the progress of the fighting in various fields.

Paris Official. Paris, Sept. 25.—Today's announcement concerning conditions on the Macedonian front today follows:

"On the left bank of the river Struma, British troops, consisting of the 10th and 11th divisions, have been successful in an attack upon Jambouk, to the north of Lake Doiran.

"A bombardment of Doiran resulted in capturing a line in the town. Our night advance in the north of Florina in the region of the Greek border has been successful. The British troops have reached the frontier to the north of Kozan and to the northeast of Florina. French infantry have occupied the first houses of Doiran, as a result of a successful night attack. They also have made a night advance to the north of Florina. To the west of the town, Greek troops captured by assault hill tops, which had been strongly garrisoned by the enemy. In this same locality a Bulgarian counter attack was repulsed at the point of the breach.

Paris, Sept. 25.—The French communication this afternoon in its reference to aerial news reads:

"Enemy aeroplanes yesterday attacked us in the north of the Somme. Bombing in the region of Valenciennes. Our women were slightly wounded. The material damage was insignificant.

"During the day of yesterday an enemy aeroplane attacked by one of our machines was disabled and fell to the ground north of Meusey. Three other machines were seriously damaged and compelled to make landings.

During the night of September 24-25 twelve French aviators threw down ninety-eight bombs on the village and the railroad station of Combercy. During the same night seven French aviators threw down fifty bombs upon factories at Thionville and Bouzonville, as well as upon the railroad station of Avelange-Reims. Following the bombardment of Combercy flames were seen to break out.

Zepplin Raids. Berlin, Sept. 25.—Today's official statement on the Zepplin raids in London reads:

"During the night of September 24-25 several aerial attacks dropped bombs on London on places of military importance and on the inland counties. Large fires were everywhere visible for a long time.

"Previously, before crossing the British coast the airships were fired upon by guard vessels and during the attack itself were under an extraordinary heavy fire of incendiary shells from numerous batteries in well directed volleys. Two of the airships fell victims to the anti-aircraft guns at London. All the others returned unharmed."

PRESIDENT ARRIVES AT BALTIMORE AND IS GIVEN OVATION

Chief Executive to Deliver Second Speech in Campaign for Re-election; People Stand and Cheer and Wave Handkerchiefs.

(By Evening Herald Special Wire.) Baltimore, Sept. 25.—President Wilson came to Baltimore today to deliver the second speech of his campaign for re-election. He arrived here at 1:30 p. m. this afternoon and was driven immediately to the Lytle theater for his address before the National Spanish American League. A cheering crowd of several thousand people greeted him at the station.

The demonstration which marked the president's arrival at the theater lasted nearly five minutes. The people stood and cheered and waved handkerchiefs. Several times Mr. Wilson stood and bowed while the band played.

"We want Wilson," shouted one man.

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Future of America. "I want America to stand up to the world," said the president in discussing American trade. He spoke in support of the tariff and the tariff question. "We have swung out into a new business era in America," continued the president. "Now our business has extended to the whole world. Our trade has burst its jacket. We have realized that American business men did not have enough ships to carry their goods."

The president, speaking slowly, turned to a discussion of the banking system of the United States. "Only a very recent year," he said, "have we attained the present position. Not until the present federal reserve act was passed did American bankers have proper facilities for carrying on foreign business."

"Not only when this war is over, but now, America must take her stand in American business on a world scale. We must have an operation between all. As a step in this direction he advocated a law to allow American exporters to utilize common selling agencies abroad. I desire monopoly and have an enthusiasm for cooperation," he declared.

The trend of laws in the United States according to the president will be to remove "all impediments" from the activities of the people of the nation.

Speaking of the need of more ships for America, he asserted that "we cannot lose any time in getting the means of delivering our goods to foreign markets." He explained the shipping bill by saying that under it the government will seek to build up trade routes but will step aside when private capital wants to step up the business.

The real source of foreign relationships, he said, is the wealth of friendship and common understanding.
