## CHICAGO MAN AVERS HE HAS CONFIDENCE IN WIFE CONCERNED IN SHOOTING CASE

### J. C. Le Duc Expresses Loyalty to His Spouse Who Is Lying in a Philadelphia Hospital With Bullet in Her Brain.

### TELLS HER TO CHEER UP; THAT ALL IS FORGIVEN

### Wounded Woman Gives the First Coherent Account of Shooting Scrape That Claims Lives of Two; Act of Jealousy.

Philadelphia, Pa., Sept. 28.—(By Evening Herald Special Wire.)—Mrs. Le Duc, wife of J. C. Le Duc, who was shot in the head by her husband in a Philadelphia hospital, today gave the first coherent account of the shooting which claimed the lives of both. Mrs. Le Duc said she was in the hospital when she was shot and that she had no confidence in her husband at that time and that she would stick to her through all her trouble.

Mrs. Le Duc is in Jefferson hospital and she was injured and then hospitalized in Philadelphia. She said she was shot in the head by her husband in a Philadelphia hospital and that she had no confidence in her husband at that time and that she would stick to her through all her trouble.

Mrs. Le Duc said she came to Philadelphia by train and did not know her husband as reported in her newspaper. She denied that she had traveled to various cities with her husband and suggested that her identity had been confused with that of Mrs. Heiser.

## STEAMSHIP LINES ON THE PACIFIC COAST WILL CONSOLIDATE

### Big Merger Has Been Arranged for, Effective November 1; Vessels Involved Are Said to be Valued at \$12,000,000.

San Francisco, Sept. 28.—(By Evening Herald Special Wire.)—The merger of the Pacific Coast Steamship Lines, which was announced here last night, is the most important business transaction in the shipping industry since the formation of the United Fruit Company. The merger involves the consolidation of the Pacific Coast Steamship Lines, the Alaska Navigation Company, the Puget Sound Navigation Company, and the Puget Sound Steamship Company, all of which are controlled by the same interests.

The financial details of the merger were not given out in the announcement made here, but the vessels involved are said to be valued at more than \$12,000,000. The merger involves ships ranging in size from 2,000 tons to the 10,000-ton Alaska Navigation Company ship, the Albatross. The merger is expected to be completed by November 1, 1916.

The merger of the Pacific Coast Steamship Lines, the Alaska Navigation Company, the Puget Sound Navigation Company, and the Puget Sound Steamship Company, all of which are controlled by the same interests, is expected to be completed by November 1, 1916.
