

POLLS OPEN AT 9 A. M. AND CLOSE AT 6 P. M.

Big Vote Expected Tomorrow; Women to Cast First Ballots

Preparations for the heaviest vote in the city, county, state and nation are virtually complete.

The polls will open at 9 o'clock and remain open until six o'clock at night when the official count of the ballots will be started.

Under the state law, however, the men are allowed two hours on full pay for voting.

Automobiles with democratic and republican banners are to be out early to take the voters to the polls.

Persons who have not registered and who are qualified voters may vote by making out an affidavit.

New Mexico Game Commission Bill Gets Indorsement

The New Mexico Game Protective association has just received from J. L. Hunter, assistant executive officer of the California Fish and Game association, a strong endorsement of the New Mexico Game commission bill.

Mr. Hunter states the principles of the New Mexico plan are sound and progressive and offers a number of detailed criticisms for the protection of the draft of the bill.

He also urges that the bill provide for the employment of a high-class executive as State Game and Fish warden. No reasonable salary is too high, he says.

Mr. Hunter also urges the advisability of establishing state fish hatcheries as soon as the non-political management of the game department is assured.

Officers of the New Mexico Game Protective association state that the draft of the proposed game commission is now in the hands of attorneys and after further revision will again be published for the information of the public in the next issue of the Fine Game.

RAIN HOLDS CROWD AT HANNA RALLY

Audience Twice Starts to Bolt But Downpour Drives Them Back

Denial that he was a mud slinger and that he and Frank Hahbell were so busy working for the "cause" that they had not had time to talk to each other were outstanding statements in the address of Judge R. H. Hanna, democratic candidate for governor at the democratic rally at the Armory Saturday night.

When Antonio Lucero, democratic candidate for congress, arose to speak at the conclusion of Judge Hanna's address, a large portion of the crowd left the hall.

As Robert E. Putney, the third speaker, came forward to take the platform there was another rush by a portion of the audience for the door.

"It's raining outside," called Mr. Putney. "Please don't go away. I don't want to be left here alone."

His words had little weight as practically all those who had started home continued on their way out the front door despite a pouring rain outside.

Only Touches on Labor. Judge Hanna said but little on the labor question. He said that he was charged with being for the open shop because he was one of the incorporators of the Albuquerque Business Men's association.

He attacked the methods of gerrymandering in the state which he said had been done by republicans, asserting that New Mexico should have at least a billion dollars on its tax rolls, and that it now had but \$375,000,000; that the democrats are not fighting the republican party but the leaders "who have chloroformed the republicans and stolen their votes."

He said that the democrats were for the league of nations because "the brains of the world for it to stop the curse of war." He said the democrats were not going to buy or steal the election.

Mr. Lucero said the republicans were proved because Wilson proposed the league of nations and that everyone thought it a good thing. The republicans were opposed to it he said just to make an issue in this campaign.

Mr. Putney said the three of them could compete with any circus in town and told the audience that he had always been spoken of as the comedian of the party. He said he had been asking other audiences in his trip about the state to pray for the success of the democratic campaign, and that really all the democrats had to offer their prayer was prayer.

Red Cross Home Service Offices Will Be Moved

Announcement was made today of the temporary removal of the Red Cross home service offices from the federal building to the W. O. W. building next to the army recruiting station. The change will be made on Wednesday.

The home service which occupies the judge's chambers during the year is required to vacate during each term of the federal court. The court will convene here on November 4. Last year the home service occupied rooms in the Wright building during the court session.

It was hoped to find quarters for the home service in connection with the salvage and shop. The latter movement has not yet been started in the city, however, so the home service engaged rooms of its own. It will remain in the central avenue offices for six weeks.
