SCHWAB IN TEARS AT SHIP BOARD PROBE

Denies He Drew \$260,000 From Government for Expenses

NEW YORK, Jan. 25.—Tears came to the eyes of Charles M. Schwab, steel magnate, when he reappeared late today before the Walsh committee, investigating shipping board affairs...

In a choking voice he told the committee of a meeting he had had with Perley Morse, head of the auditing firm claiming to have found the voucher, after Mr. Morse had testified regarding the discovery and Mr. Schwab had denied receiving anything from the government.

Mr. Schwab, in reply to a question, said he finally had agreed to meet Mr. Morse at a hotel after he had been approached by a man who sought to arrange a meeting in Morse's office at a club.

"There I told Morse the facts as I stated them on the witness stand were true," said Mr. Schwab. "The matter coming at the conclusion of forty years of a business career will be as deep in my heart as I told Mr. Morse to correct it, and I told him I hoped he would correct it."

To Enrich Results. Mr. Grant agreed to supply the committee with substitute copies of vouchers of the corporation. These would prove beyond doubt, he said, that no part of the item had ever been charged to ship construction.

HOUSE VOTES ON ABOLISHING FOUR OFFICES

First of Bills Adopted Eliminates Insurance Commissioner

SANTA FE, N. M., Jan. 25.—The house of representatives this afternoon took up for passage four bills to abolish offices described by Governor Mechem in his message as unnecessary. These are the office of insurance commissioner, legal adviser, the mounted police force and the surveyor and superintendent.

Opposition developed in the regular session, led by representative R. L. Davis, to immediate passage of the bill abolishing the mounted police. The speaker, however, proposed immediate passage of all four bills which came before the house this afternoon.

The insurance commissioner's repeal bill passed without opposition, and the mounted police repeal was then taken up, with Representative Carter, the majority floor leader, stating its passage as a resolution campaign strategy and a measure of public economy.

While opposition was expected on the floor the passage of the bill was limited for during the session. Bills repealing the legal adviser and surveyor and superintendent were expected to pass without opposition.
