85 MEN, SEIZED FOR RANSOM IN MEXICO, RELEASED

Message to Washington Says Prisoners Are "Not Now Held"

WASHINGTON, June 29.—Dispatches to the state department today from Consul Shaw at Tampico indicated that the 85 employees of the British-owned La Corona Oil company, including the half dozen Americans held yesterday for ransom, by outlaws had been released. The message was very brief, and not clear, the department telegraphed immediately for an explanation.

The consul said merely that the 85 persons referred to in his report yesterday of the new bandit raid were "not now held." It was not stated whether the bandits had withdrawn from the property at the Pecora camp of the oil company or whether any payment had been made.

WASHINGTON, June 30.—Although the situation resulting from bandit activities in the Tampico oil region of Mexico had been considerably cleared today by the release of the forty American employees of the Cortez oil company held by the rebel band for ransom, the state department was still awaiting advice as to the half dozen Americans included among the 85 men later seized at the Pecora camp of the British-owned La Corona company by the same band, headed by the rebel, Guro-Save.

The rebels demanded \$500,000 by July 2 for surrender of the Pecora property and the employees. The department had not been advised today whether the fifteen thousand pesos demanded at the Aguada camp was paid.

Charge D'Affaires Summerlin, was directed to press the Mexican authorities to capture and punish the bandits who captured A. Bruce Bielaski. No details of Mr. Bielaski's escape had reached the department today.

Burch Testimony In Obenchain Trial Is Planned Today

LOS ANGELES, June 29.—Efforts to obtain testimony from Arthur C. Burch, her co-defendant, were planned by the prosecution today at the trial of Mrs. Madalyn Obenchain for the murder of J. Milton Kennedy.

In addition, the state counsel announced, S. K. Hahn, an attorney, who represented Mrs. Obenchain for a short time immediately following her arrest, would be summoned, as would Chester G. Hanson, Los Angeles newspaperman, who attended college with both Mrs. Obenchain and Burch.

Cross-examination of Mrs. Mary A. Balliff, formerly a friend of Mrs. Obenchain, also was expected today.

Mrs. Balliff testified for the state yesterday concerning a dream she said she had and which she declared Mrs. Obenchain had interpreted as portending the death of Kennedy.

At police headquarters a doctor said Wooten was sane, the sergeant who had been disorderly, the policeman said he had no other charge, so he was turned out of the station.

Comptroller Decides On Banking Policy

WASHINGTON, June 29.—Comptroller of the Currency Crisinger is understood virtually to have decided on a policy toward the most question of the right of national banks to establish branches.

He is said to take the view that "additional offices might be established by national banks under proper circumstances, but 'branches' might not be maintained."

Belief was expressed at the treasury today that the comptroller would issue a formal ruling covering the question in general but that applications of national banks for the privilege of opening additional offices would be handled on the merits of each individual case.

International Bridge To Be Reconstructed

EAGLE PASS, Tex., June 29.—Reconstruction of the railway bridge across the Rio Grande connecting this city with Piedras Negras has been agreed upon at a conference of officials of the Southern Pacific railroad and the Mexican National lines. It was announced here today.

The old bridge was destroyed by the recent flood. Work on the new structure will begin at once, it was announced. The cost, estimated at \$300,000, will be divided equally between the two railways.

The international foot and vehicle bridge will also be rebuilt soon at a cost of \$250,000.

AGENT POSES AS CLERK AND ARRESTS FIVE

SECRET SERVICE MEN TELL HOW ALLEGED THIEVES ARE CAUGHT

NEW YORK, June 29.—Secret service officials described today how a federal agent posing as a broker's employe willing to exchange stolen Liberty bonds for other securities conducted negotiations which led to the arrest of five men in connection with a mail truck robbery in Los Angeles March 2, and thefts from the First National bank of Clayburg, Pa. All were charged with possessing Liberty bonds, knowing them to have been altered, forged or stolen.

The men arrested are Thomas Larkin, who said he was president of the Trans-Coast Finance company; W. P. Pierce, Albert Fitzroy, Abraham Rosenthal and Robert Burns. Officials said that a federal agent was approached by a man who, unaware to whom he was talking, confided that he could "clean up a pile of money" handling Liberty bonds.

The agent was interested and more so when his acquaintance said he could get hold of \$500,000 in securities.

The federal agent posed as a copy clerk in a broker's office, sure that willing to take the stolen bonds registered or otherwise substituted them for negotiable bonds taken from his employer's strong box.

Pierce, it is charged, turned over \$10,000 worth of bonds to the "broker's clerk" promising to bring \$40,000 worth later. The second time he appeared he was arrested. Then the others, who had been under surveillance, were picked up.

Officials said they had evidence that Pierce disposed of at least \$6,000 worth of bonds stolen in Los Angeles.

EXPLORER LEAVES HOME ON JOURNEY TO NORTH POLE

Captain Amundsen To Attempt To Fly Across icy Area

NOME, Alaska, June 29.—(By the Associated Press)—Captain Roald Amundsen the explorer, today was on the first leg of the Arctic journey on which he will attempt to fly across the north pole. He sailed from Nome yesterday afternoon, in his expedition schooner, the Maud.

From Point Barrow, the northern extremity of Alaska, he plans to take off 12 about three weeks in an airplane flight which he hopes will land him less than 24 hours later on the island of Spitzbergen or on Cape Columbia, Greenland, northern Greenland.

With the Norwegian explorer sailed Eimer G. Fullerton, Canadian member of the British royal air forces who will pilot the 154 horsepower Junker monoplane in its flight.

From now on the only communication Amundsen will have will be the powerful radio apparatus with which the Maud was fitted before she sailed from Seattle early this month.

Officers of Middle Rio Grande Valley Association Named

Embodiment approval of the reclamation project of the Smith-McNary bill was unanimously voiced by 14 directors of the Middle Rio Grande Valley association who met here yesterday afternoon at the Chamber of Commerce parlors to formulate the permanent policies and organization of the association.

The officers of the association were elected as follows: Ed Ours, president; Frank A. Hubble, vice president; U. S. White, treasurer; and M. L. Fox, manager of the Chamber of Commerce, secretary. The directorate of the association present at the meeting represented all sections of the river valley.

The association plans a membership drive to secure at least 500 members by the first of August, the membership list at present totaling 300. Mr. White reported that there was a gross balance of \$1,125 in the treasury. In case of an emergency when it would be impossible to form a quorum of directors, an executive committee was selected with power to act as the directorate.

It is to be composed of the president, vice president and secretary, ex-officio, and Jesus Romero, representing Bernalillo county; F. C. de Baca, and Charles Brown, representing Sandoval county; C. T. Brown and C. L. Talmadge, representing Socorro county, and P. D. Hanna, representing Valencia county.

Another meeting of the directorate of the association will be called shortly, according to Mr. Fox, secretary. The date has not yet been decided upon. Fourteen out of 20 directors of the association were present at the meeting yesterday.

Juan Jose Griego, cowboy and rancher of Sandoval county, was brought to the Presbyterian hospital here this morning, with a broken and mangled hand which resulted from an accident which happened yesterday.

According to his sister, who came here with him, he was trying to rope a steer on his ranch 75 miles north of Albuquerque yesterday morning. The steer lightened on his right hand and twisted it as he passed the animal. Following the accident he rode back to the ranch house, a distance of several miles, and was then brought to Albuquerque in an automobile. Dr. W. J. Lovelace was summoned.


