LOCAL HAPPENINGS IN AND AROUND THE CAPITAL.

Short Items of News Gathered on the Fly by the Chronicle's Reporters.

The March term of Wake county criminal court begins to-morrow.

The Governor's Guard will hold a special meeting in their armory on Monday night.

It is noticed that there are more birds of more different kinds in and around the city just now than have ever been known here.

The city officers are arranging a tabulated statement of the statistics of Raleigh—financial, social and criminal—for the census bureau at Washington.

There will be a young men's meeting at the Wilmington Street Mission to-morrow afternoon from 3:30 to 4:30 o'clock.

BULLS SELL OUT

And are Content with Present Profits. Everything Steady.

NEW YORK, March 22.—Messrs. Hubbard, Price & Co., in their cotton circular to-night say: Manchester was evidently in need of cotton yesterday, as the cable reports additional sales, and the close of business of 3,000 bales, and to-day they purchased freely in Liverpool.

It is, however, evident that the bulls were willing sellers, particularly the offerings of futures, particularly the summer months, were free enough to close that market quiet.

The market is dull. Operators are indisposed to follow it, and are waiting for more decided developments abroad before taking large lines of it upon the strong position in America; while the bulls have sold freely, taking their profits upon this last advance.

According to the Chronicle, the crop of 1889 is now 337,000 bales ahead of that of 1888; the visible supply is 180,000 bales larger, of which 93,000 bales are American.
