A SUMMARY OF THE RELIGIOUS NEWS OF THE STATE.

An Outline of the Influence Exerted by The Churches in North Carolina—Items of Interest.

The State Convention of the W. C. T. U. of North Carolina, will be held at Concord July 16th, 17th, 18th and 19th.

Joint revival services have been held by the Methodists and Presbyterians in Washington this week.

On last Sunday the Charlotte church-going people were pleasantly surprised.

Mr. Lee, the evangelist of Edenton, is conducting one of the most successful revivals ever held in Hyde county.

Union meetings are held nightly in the Sam Jones' tent by ministers of the different denominations.

MISSIONARY BAPTISTS.

A revival is in progress by Rev. W. R. Gwaltney in Greensboro.

Rev. Baylus Cade, one of the ablest and brightest preachers in the South has resigned the pastorate of the Franklin church.

A Sunday School Association is in session at Clinton this week.

Rev. Dr. H. A. Tupper, corresponding secretary of the foreign mission board of the Southern Baptist Convention, requests us to say to the North Carolina Baptists that they will be sent, between this and April 30th, \$2,000.00, in order that their offerings for foreign missions this year shall equal those of last year.

THE LUTHERAN CHURCH.

Rev. F. W. E. Peschau, of Wilmington, arrived in the city to-day from Mt. Pleasant, and spent the afternoon with his friends here.

MEETING OF FRIENDS.

The representative meeting of the Society of Friends of North Carolina was held on the 14th at Centre, Guilford county.

An earnest appeal was ordered to be made to Congress against making appropriations for military preparations.

Evangelist W. D. Morton is preaching in Wilson.

Orange Presbytery.

Graham, N. C., April 19.—The Presbytery of Orange has been in session since Wednesday evening.

Commissioners to represent the Presbytery in the General Assembly of the Southern Presbyterian Church, which is to meet in Asheville in May, were likewise chosen.

Rev. Dr. Johnston who has been the stated clerk of the Presbytery for the last ten or twelve years, resigned his office in view of his removal into Albemarle Presbytery.

The Rev. H. T. Darnall, of Durham, was elected then as his successor in office.

The home mission work engaged the

Presbytery to a large extent, and plans for carrying on this work, especially in the Western counties, were proposed and discussed.

A pleasant episode occurred yesterday afternoon, when the proceedings of the Presbytery were suspended for a few minutes for the performance of the marriage ceremony, the parties so united being Mr. Rankin, of Guilford, and Miss M. Piper, of—, the Rev. Mr. Culbertson officiating.

The Rev. Goodridge A. Wilson, from Virginia, was received into membership of the Presbytery, and arrangements made for his installation as pastor of Hawfields and Cross Roads churches, in this county.

The Presbytery will adjourn sine die to-day. The next meeting will be held in October, at Winston.
