Col. Rufus Amis, of Granville county, is said to be gaining astonishing strength as a candidate for the Congressional nomination on the republican ticket. He will try to lead all the enemies of Brover and defeat his nomination, but we rather think that he will not get there this time.—Milton Advertiser.

There is a strong sentiment in favor of Mr. R. W. Winston for Judge of the 5th District. A gentleman remarked to the writer yesterday that Mr. Winston was a thorough Christian gentleman and a profound lawyer, and that the people would be blessed in his election. Col. Skinner Will Not Run.

Some days ago, the Elizabeth City Economist mentioned Col. Harry Skinner as one of the candidates for Congress in the First District. Mr. Skinner writes to the Economist the following letter:

While I highly appreciate the consideration of my name in connection with such an honorable and responsible position, yet in justice to myself, I am unwilling to have my name used in that connection, so as to have friends in the district and State think that I would antagonize my brother, the present incumbent, or interfere with the candidacy of anyone mentioned who is my senior in years or party service. So you have authority from me to announce that I am not and will not be a candidate for the 52d Congress.

I would feel no pride or interest in going to Congress except as an auxiliary to the new school of progressive political economy, and as an assistant in advancing legislation in the interest and for the amelioration of the depressed laboring and agricultural masses.

I know the present incumbent is abreast with the advance thought in this line, and with his experience can and will accomplish more and in all respects make an abler and better representative than myself.

Any way, my blood is too thick to antagonize him, and my sense of propriety too keen to stand in the way of those whose claims are superior to mine, and whose services and sacrifices entitle them to consideration.
