

THE PIOUS FRAUD AGAIN.

COL. ELLIOTT F. SHEPARD CAN'T HAVE HIS WAY FOR ONCE.

He is of the Wannamaker and Harrison Order of Saints, and spends half his time concocting lies about the South—other notes.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 28, 1890.—Col. Elliott Shepard, the editor of the New York Mail and Express, spent part of the week in this city. He is a notorious, long-faced hypocritical South-wester. It is said he contributed about \$50,000 of his wife's money (she was a Miss Vanderbilt) to this boodle administration, and is quite intimate at the White House. His daughter has been Mrs. Harrison's guest several days, and was treated with great distinction. Shepard keeps a Bible text floating at the head of his venom freighted paper, belonging to the John Wannamaker order of saints and spends half his time concocting lies about that section of this Union south of the Potomac. His last vagary is to object to the name of the Arlington Hotel here. He thinks it is too great a compliment to call the most fashionable hotel here after the estate of that "traitor," Robert E. Lee! He probably thinks it would be more appropriate to call it "The House of the Good Shepherd." He can't have his way in this matter, however, in spite of his control of some of the Vanderbilt millions. The Arlington hotel belongs to the estate of the late W. W. Corcoran, Esq., one of General Robert E. Lee's warmest friends and admirers. The property cannot be bought by Col. Shepard, and the name will remain the same. The next administration will probably be Democratic, and such a like Shepard, Wannamaker and Safe-Care Warner will be relegated to their proper sphere of selling breeches and quack medicines to credulous posing statesmen and villifying men whose valets are not fit to be self-respecting republicans are already ashamed of the quality of the books-ringers who are now at the front, and Benny Harrison's administration will go down to history as one of the weakest and most disreputable in the annals of the Republic.

H. C. Tyson, of North Carolina, has been promoted in the Treasury department.

Young Dr. B. A. Capehart is building up a good practice here. He is the son of Mr. Baldy Capehart, of Granville county, and a nephew of Dr. Capehart, of Avoca. Rev. Dr. E. S. McArthur, of New York, is announced to lecture at the Congregational church next Wednesday evening on "The Empire of the Czar." The lecture is given in the interest of the Rankin-Richards Institute of Windsor, N. C.

Hon. W. L. Trenholm, Mr. Cleveland's able Comptroller of the Currency, is in the city. He has been made president of a rich concern in New York and draws a handsome salary. He is the son of Hon. Geo. A. Trenholm, Secretary of the Southern Confederacy.

Saturday the Senate in joint resolution to authorize Lieutenant Henry E. Lemley, U. S. A., to accept a position under the government of Columbia (instructor of the national military school at Bogota) was reported and passed. Lieutenant Lemley tells me he expects to sail about May 15th. He is an accomplished young officer, speaks and writes Spanish like a native and will reflect credit on his State and native town of Salem, wherever he goes. He has visited South America before and was of invaluable aid to the South American Congress during its recent session here. His brother, Lieutenant Sam Lemley, is a officer in the U. S. Navy.

The injustice and absurdity of the McKinley tariff bill excited such general dissatisfaction that the Republicans are obliged to abandon it. It is conceded that the bill can never become a law, but the Republican majority in the House has so thoroughly committed itself that the bill is expected to pass the House by a strict party vote. In the meantime the Republicans of the Senate finance committee are at work on another bill as a substitute for the McKinley bill. They expect to report it to the Senate very soon after the McKinley bill passes the House.

The Republican joint caucus committee of the House and Senate have agreed upon the basis for the preparation of a silver bill. It directs the Secretary of the Treasury to purchase 4,500,000 ounces of free silver per month at the market price, not to exceed \$1 for 371-20 grains of pure silver, and issue Treasury notes in payment of the demand for lawful money of the United States, and are receivable for all public dues. No greater or less amount of such notes shall be outstanding at any time than the cost of the silver bullion then held in the Treasury, purchased by such notes. Upon demand of the holder of any such Treasury notes, the Secretary of the Treasury may, at his discretion, pay off such notes with silver bullion at its market price. The Secretary is also permitted to coin this bullion, should it be necessary, for the redemption of these proposed Treasury notes, \$75,000,000 held to redeem the circulation of banks will be restored to general circulation.


