It is going to be an event of a life time, and no wise editor will consent to be away from the Durham Convention. The following is the full

HOW CHEATHAM WAS BULLDOZED AND BRIBED.
In yesterday's CHRONICLE we stated that REED had probably bulldozed CHEATHAM into voting for the Federal Election Law. When the editor was in Washington a few days ago he heard that REED & Co. had promised CHEATHAM and a few other Southern Republicans that if they would vote for the Federal Election Law he would secure the passage of the Blair Bill, or one like it, and he promised the N. C. members that he would give it the name of "The Cheatham Educational Bill." That was the bribe offered the colored Congressman, so we heard.
Yesterday the House committee reported the Blair bill—or one about like it, introduced by CHEATHAM—favorably. It had been allowed to slumber six months, and was thought to be dead.
Now, if to-day CHEATHAM votes for the Federal Election law, we will be able to "fix" the trade.

THE WOMEN WINNING.

There are certain "spheres" in which the supremacy of women has been from time immemorial conceded by all men. There are some other spheres in which their supremacy has not been so freely conceded, but in which they seem disposed to demand recognition. The Chronicle has from time to time noted such demands, and another one was made prominent in the National Press Association at its meeting in Boston last week.
North Carolina, in such Associations, generally gets one of the offices, but she failed in the Press Association. JOSEPHUS DANIELS was run for a vice-president, but an editor from the wild and woolly west who had read a woman's rights poem was nominated against DANIELS. A woman seconded the Western man's nomination, and he was elected in spite of a big vote for DANIELS.

Editor McDONALD, of the Lumberman Robesonian, who was at the convention, related these circumstances to the Chronicle. "I reckon North Carolina would have got there," he said, "if the women hadn't been against us." And he laughed a cheerful, resonant laugh, that would have tickled the mayor of Boston to death.
