A Statement of What the Convention Did.

There has been much discussion in the past few days over the report that the Gaston county Democratic Convention voted down a resolution instructing for VANCE. We have not alluded to it because we preferred to wait for a clear statement. We have it now from the Gastonia Gazette. The high character of the editor is a guarantee that it is accurate. After publishing the resolutions, the Gazette says:

The name of Vance was greeted with the most enthusiastic cheers, yet the wildest confusion followed a motion to adopt the resolutions.

To make the situation understood it is necessary to state that after the nomination of Mr. Stroup for representative, he was asked to state before the convention whether or not, if elected, he would vote for Senator Vance's re-election to the United States Senate. He seemed very unwilling to answer the question directly, and when repeatedly plied with the question and pressed for a direct answer, he said that he had always been a Vance man and was a Vance man now but he couldn't say how it would be when he went to the Legislature. Quite a number were evidently satisfied with this answer, while many others plainly manifested very decided dissatisfaction and disappointment. After some confusion, however, the convention proceeded with its regular business.

So, when the resolution instructing our representative to vote for Senator Vance came up, "some therefore cried one thing and some another, for the assembly was confused, and the more part knew not wherefore they were come together." So great was the hubbub that it seemed impossible to get a vote on the resolutions, and the matter was passed over with the understanding that if further discussion were desired it should be had after finishing the regular business of the convention—for at the time these resolutions were introduced the delegates named above had not been chosen.

It is our individual opinion that if the resolutions had come to a vote they would have been carried by a large majority. We base this opinion partly on the enthusiasm manifested at the name of Vance, and partly on the fact that the advocates of the resolutions clamored for a vote, while those who had appeared as backing Mr. Stroup in not committing himself to the support of Senator Vance seemed unwilling to vote.

It is our impression that the only feature of the resolution objected to was that instructing our representative to vote for Senator Vance.
