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THE POPULATION

OF THE UNITED STATES ACCORDING TO THE LAST CENSUS.

The Data so far Shows a Disappointing Increase.—How Some of the States Have Changed as to Rank in Population.—Interesting Statistics of this Great Nation.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.—The census office to day announced the population of the United States, as shown by the first count of persons and families, exclusive of white persons in Indian Territory, Indians on reservations and in Alaska.

The bulletin announcing these figures is addressed to Secretary Noble and signed by Superintendent Porter. It says: Upon their face these figures show that the population has increased between 1880 and 1890, only 727,345 more than between 1870 and 1880.

Such reduction in the rate of increase in the face of the enormous immigration during the past ten years would argue a great diminution in the fecundity of the population, or a corresponding increase in the death rate.

These omissions were not the fault of the census office. The census of 1870 was taken under a law which the superintendent, Genl. Francis A. Walker, characterized as "clumsy, antiquated and barbarous."

The population of Virginia is placed at 1,618,911, an increase of 136,366 during the past ten years; that of North Carolina, 1,617,319, an increase since 1880 of 217,590.

Vermont and Nevada are two States that show a decrease in population during the decade. In the former there has been a trifling absolute decrease, while Nevada shows an absolute diminution in population of 17,939, nearly 9 per cent., leaving its population the smallest of all the States.

A DOUBLE LYNCHING.

Two Negroes Pursued 50 Miles and Captured—Then Lynched by a Mob—for the Perpetration of a Foul Crime.

DALTON, Ga., Oct. 31.—The two negroes who had been followed fifty miles and captured, charged with the outrage and murder of Miss Baker, in Bartow county, were taken from the cellars last night by a mob and carried into the country.

The finding of the dead body of the girl by her father was agonizing. Some distance from the house is a stretch of woods, and in the road leading to it the father discovered a pool of blood and evidence of a fearful struggle.

CHARLOTTE, N. C., Oct. 31. Speaker Reed had a precedent in his quorum counting in a Democratic speaker of the North Carolina House of Representatives, who is now a Republican solicitor for the western district of this State and candidate for judge on the Republican ticket.
