THE WORLD'S COMMERCE.
New York, December 24—Messrs. Hubbard, Price & Company in their cotton circular to-night say: "A fair business is reported from Liverpool to-day, spinners taking 9,000 bales, though the arrival market closes quiet at a partial decline from yesterday's quotation. These advices led to a covering demand, and a consequent reaction in values, as foreshadowed, but the early buyers were disappointed at the tenor of Liverpool advices, and upon the news that the receipts at the interior towns were larger than last year withdrew, leaving the market without support. A slight rally at the close caused the market to be quoted steady, although there is yet no indication that the decline is over."

Receipts at the ports to-day were estimated at 34,000 bales, against 40,803 bales last week, and 33,645 bales the same week last year.

Spot cotton closed quiet; middling uplands 9-16; sales 143 bales.
Transactions in futures to-day were 125,000 bales.
