The election is less than two weeks off. Every man should do his duty and see that his name is properly registered on the new books.

Reader, are you registered, if not, why not? Do you wish to see your country ruled by scoundrels? You cannot vote unless you register. Leave your cotton field long enough to go to the Registrar of your township and have your name placed upon the books.

The fact that you registered last year or some other year will not suffice in the forthcoming election. You must be registered again. Go, therefore, resolve in your heart of hearts that you will neither eat nor sleep again until your name is properly registered, and all will be well.

Come, let us reason together, and roll up 50,000 majority for Bennett next November. Why not do so? We have the material, the right and eternal justice on our side, while the opposition party is composed of broken down party hacks, chronic of free seekers and the worst element of the Republican party, with here and there a sprinkling of good and honest Republicans, but as a whole the party is corrupt and totally unfit to rule over the destinies of the good old North State. We can, and we must give this nickle plated party such a thorough and overwhelming defeat next month that Clingman, Johnson and "My God! fellow citizens," Leach, will forever retire from the political field and the places that know them now will know them no more forever. Ohio has sounded the funeral knell of the old Republican party and now New York, Pennsylvania and North Carolina will wheel into line and forever blot out every remaining vestige of a doomed party.

LIBERAL OFFERS OF OTHERS' GOODS.

The Radical party, in Convention lately assembled, resolved, as it had done in 1868, 1869 and 1870, that "education is the bulwark of American liberty," and proposes to supply it to our children by the United States Government. Nearly nineteen hundred years ago the Devil, for a consideration proposed to give away all the kingdoms of the world and the glory of them. His power to bestow was just the same as that of the North Carolina Radicals to bestow, for a consideration, the stinky taxes held in the grasp of the Radicals at Washington. Were it otherwise, the interest of the people would be better served by paying for their schools out of their own pockets, as they do, and having their ability to pay immensely increased by the abolition of all Internal Revenue taxes. If the Government can afford to distribute these taxes, the Government can do without levying them. If its necessities require the levy, the distribution to schools cannot be made. Better for us, morally, physically, pecuniarily, to struggle on with schools as we may, than to make them the most perfect by continuing the Internal Revenue system a day longer than is necessary. While it lasts the tobacco planter's pocket is its victim, the farmer's pocket the fruit-grower's pocket, almost every man's pocket is its victim; and the health and intellects of the American people are suffering from the use of the mean liquor which monopoly induces and high taxation forces the great Northern and Western liquor manufacturers to substitute for the pure whisky of the days before we knew of the Internal Revenue Iniquity, and which may be had in the land once more only when whisky manufacture ceases to be a monopoly at once plundered and protected by the United States Government. When that day shall come, not only the heavy burdens now oppressing the planter's tobacco and the products of the farmer's grain and fruit will be removed, but greater burdens than these will be lifted from the bent shoulders of the sons of toil, the great masses of the people, who all over this broad land in the sweat of their faces eat bread. When the United States taxes on whisky and tobacco are removed, the Government's needs will force revision of the war tariff which oppresses the industries of the Union and drives off revenue from the public treasury. A revenue tariff must then be enacted—a tariff which incidentally gives to manufacturers all the protection they need or should have, supplies the wants of Government, and enables the people to buy as they are required to sell in fair markets and at fair prices.

Rishop Paine, the Senior Bishop of the M. E. Church, South, died at his residence at Aberdeen, Mississippi, at 4:20 A. M. the 19th inst in the 83rd year of his age. This venerable man of God was well and favorably known throughout the whole Union. Bishop Paine was born in Person county N. C., November 12, 1799. He took high rank as a minister from the very beginning of his ministerial life, and was called to fill many of the most important places, as presiding elder and college priest, which he always did with distinction. He died in great peace surrounded by his devoted family and a host of friends, who lament with great sorrow his death.
