

Terrapin Takes the Prize.

At the time it was caught last year Mr. Daniel Riggan, of Wake Forest, said that he marked his initials on a terrapin in 1843 while he was living at the same place that Mr. Collins now lives, the Acy George place, and therefore he thought it must be the same terrapin but before Mr. Riggan was heard from Mr. Collins cut his initials and the figures 1895 on the terrapin and turned the old fellow loose. Since that time Mr. Collins has been on the lookout for him and last week ran upon the same said old terrapin which is now in the possession of Messrs. Riggan Bros. of this place, sons of Mr. Daniel Riggan. He is evidently the same old terrapin and must be fifty three years old.

Paper Car Wheels.

Paper car wheels, says an exchange, came into use some years ago, and now they run under nearly every sleeping, parlor, and dining car in this country and thousands of passenger cars. This is the Allen paper car wheel made in Pullman, Ill. The cast-iron hub of the paper wheel is bored into the car axle, and the outside surface is made finished to within the thousandth part of an inch to the standard gauge. The body or centre of the car wheel is made of layers of strawboard glued together and then put under enormous pressure in an hydraulic press. The layers of strawboard are glued together in pairs first, and each pair is allowed to cure or dry for several weeks, and thus little by little the centre of the wheel is built up. The results of these successive operations is a material which in no way resembles paper or strawboard, but rather an extremely hard, grainless wood, so tough that it requires tools made of the very best steel to work it.
