Institute for Colored Teachers.

FROM THE COMMONWEALTH: A few of the colored teachers of Scotland Neck and vicinity met July 23, 1904, and agreed to tax themselves to the amount of one dollar each for the purpose of defraying the expenses of a Teachers' Institute which will be held in the colored Graded School building in Scotland Neck on the 15th, 16th and 17th of August, 1904, according to the advice of Dr. A. S. Harrison and the confidence and agreement of the teachers. We have secured the services of Prof. C. W. Wilson as manager and instructor of said Institute.

It will be quite a treat for the teachers to participate, especially under the management of Prof. Wilson, a man whom we know to be fully competent in every sense of the word.

It will also be a stimulus to the colored teachers of Scotland Neck and vicinity as we have not had anything of the kind before.
