The Electric Plant to Enlarge.

On account of the increasing load at the Electric Light Plant the Town Commissioners have decided to install a larger dynamo and substitute tungsten lamps for the ones now in use on the streets. There will be lights at some street corners where there are now none and on the whole the streets will be better lit up than at present. It is calculated that the capacity of the plant will be increased thirty-three and one-third per cent and that there will be considerable saving in fuel. This change will allow us to use the efficient tungsten lamps in multiple as they are used in cities and will give us standard equipment. These changes will be worth much both to the customers and to the Light Plant.
