COTTON SHARP AVANCE ON NEW YORK MARKET

New York, Sept. 25.—Today's cotton market made a sharp early advance. January sold up to 16.34 before the end of the morning or 38 points above the low level of Saturday, but offerings, increased and the price reached to 16.15, closing at 16.18. The general list closed steady at a net gain of 3 to 9 points. The market opened firm at an advance of 6 to 16 points in response to relatively firm cables.

French Hold Won Positions.

Paris, Sept. 25.—In an effort to retrieve in part their lost territory, the Germans last week, despite the bad weather, made violent attacks against the French over a three-mile front in the region of the Priez farm and Bouchavesnes, north of the Somme. In mass formation the Teutons threw attack after attack along the line from 8 o'clock in the morning until darkness and at the end of the day the French were everywhere holding their positions, according to the war office, and the battlefield at points was covered with German dead.

Veteran of Three Wars Dead.

Richmond, September 24.—Captain John Maxwell, aged 84, a native of Scotland and a veteran of the Crimean, Confederate and Spanish Wars, is dead in his home here of old age. He won the Victoria cross in the Crimea. As a Confederate naval officer, he participated in the development of the torpedo.

Forming Wilson-Bickett Clubs.

Formation of Wilson-Bickett clubs in the colleges of this State will begin at Wake Forest College on October 11, when Mr. Robert Gantt of Durham, organizer (will assist in perfecting the organization) after Attorney General and Governor-to-be Bickett makes an address. Following this the Trinity Club will be organized with Senator Overman as speaker of the occasion, and Carolina with Victor S. Bryant as speaker.
