### ADDRESS BY DR. DICKINSON.

The Educational Campaign began at Calvary Methodist Church last night with an address by Dr. E. T. Dickinson.

Dr. L. J. Smith speaks tonight at 8:15 P. M.

The special educational campaign under the direction of the local Y. M. C. A. and Calvary Methodist church began last night at Calvary church with an address by Dr. E. T. Dickinson on "Personal Hygiene." Dr. Dickinson emphasized the importance of good health and how to keep it. He spoke in part as follows:

"We are supposed to come in the world in good health and the object is to keep it. Too often we do not see the use of good health. Those who are healthy and strong do not appreciate it, and those who are weak and sickly are too low to hope to be benefited by it. But good health is something everybody can have and enjoy. The poor can have it as well as the rich if they will follow certain rules and principles.

"The human body is a machine highly elastic which can be adjusted to meet the changing conditions of life. To keep it within proper bounds is to have good health; to stretch it beyond its bounds is to have disorder and bad health. This little machine is made up of certain organs which run it and keep it going. As long as they are normal and perform their functions we are healthy and strong. When they get out of order and fail to perform their functions we get sick. Take for example an automobile. It must have three things to keep it going, namely, gasoline, oil and water. If one of these gives out the machine gets out of order and does not run well. So the human machine has certain organs which are essential to keep it going, namely the lungs or respiratory organs, the muscles or organs of locomotion, the digestive organs, and the nervous system. When one of these organs is weakened by failure to care for it our machine is weak and we are unhealthy. But if we care for these organs and keep them performing their functions our machine is strong and we are healthy.

In conclusion Dr. Dickinson made a strong appeal against patent medicine. So many people get in the habit of taking medicine and feel like they can not get along without it. Most of them do not know what they are taking it for. They take it simply because they feel like they ought to have some medicine. Often times it is the worst thing for them. Most of us do not need much medicine. When you aid an organ by taking medicine it has a tendency to take a rest and as a result we have to aid it more. It is best to stimulate it some other way than by taking medicine.

This evening at 8:15 Dr. L. J. Smith will speak on the "Causes and prevention of diseases." The public is cordially invited to hear him at that time.
