enough of the wanted support, Friends of Mr. Gardner believe he can poll as much of the "anti-machine" vote as any other candidate but they do not think he ought to make the race since "it is the East's time." The precedent might be broken, however, and they know of nobody more capable than the Selby man who would enter the race without having to employ a press agent to tell who he is.

This eliminates everybody except Mr. Bailey, who has already announced that "whoever makes the race must run on the platform I have laid down." That declaration is taken by many as an admission that Bailey will be in the race in 1924. Mr. Bailey has always voted with Mr. McLean and is known as a good "machine" man. Whether he will forsake the faith in 1924 is another question.

The general opinion voiced here today at noon when argument was being made in the case charging Dr. J. M. Manning, mayor of Durham, with violating the Harrison anti-narcotic act was that the jury would return a verdict of "not guilty" shortly after receiving Judge Henry

C. Connor's charge. The only evidence introduced by the government was that given by Mrs. J. M. O'Kelly, secretary of the Durham city and county department of health. Mrs. O'Kelly testified that she dispensed morphine to a total of 16 patients, considered by Dr. Manning as incurable drug addicts, at the instance of Dr. Manning. She kept an accurate record of every bottle of morphine given to the patients, she testified yesterday and submitted the report as evidence. There was no inclination on the part of Dr. Manning, she said, to conceal the fact that the addicts were being treated and in many instances the patients were supplied with the drug when they could not pay for it. This, she said, was in accordance with Dr. Manning's instructions.

A score of character witnesses were put on the stand by the defense all of whom testified to the high character and reputation of Dr. Manning. Among those who testified were:

JOHNNIE MOORE FOUND GUILTY MINNIE MOORE

(Continued from page one)
good behaviour.

This morning about three o'clock the jury in the case of Johnnie Moore and Minnie Moore for the shooting and killing of Andrew Moore, the husband of Minnie Moore last February in Saratoga in the home of Andrew Moore, brought in a verdict of guilty as to Johnnie Moore and not guilty as to Minnie Moore. The court had already agreed that the defendants were being tried for manslaughter, or murder in the second degree. Judge Horton was sent for and came over and received the verdict. He left the matter of the sentence to the jury and they retired and in a few moments returned with a verdict of six months, and so the woman goes free.

Late yesterday afternoon the evidence was finished and the attorneys began their speeches to the jury. They were all able and the case was one of the hardest fought ever held in the Wilson court house. It was ten o'clock last night when Judge Horton delivered a very able charge and the case went to the jury.

The speeches in the order in which they came were as follows, Mr. F. D. Swindell for the prosecution, Mr. Oliver Rand for the defense, Mr. W. A. Finch for the prosecution, Mr. John E. Woodard for the defense, Mr. W. A. Lucas for the defense, and Mr. Richard Allsbrook solicitor for the state.

The evidence yesterday afternoon was as follows:

Jesse Ward a negro said he heard Minnie Moore say she would put Paris green in Andrew Moore's coffee. Willie Owens said he saw John and Minnie riding together and Minnie's arm was around John's neck. Also saw the two together in Andrew Moore's home one Sunday afternoon. Andrew was asleep.

Mrs. Lon Whitley wife of Mr. Frank Whitley testified she was at home night of shooting. Corroborated what her husband said as to Mrs. Rogers coming in to see them. Heard pistol shots and saw Mrs. Minnie Moore passing the windows in the Moore home. Went to Moore home next morning, Moore was on the bed with his clothes on, and they staid on until train nurse came in. Mrs. Moore tried to give wounded man some water with teaspoon. Mrs. Moore said she hated the shooting. Witness said John and Minnie were pretty thick. They were always together, but she and her husband were together very little. John Moore came with them when they moved into the house and he lived there with them.

Witness had never seen anything improper between defendants, only they were pretty thick and always together. Levy Daniel Moore testified that Andrew Moore was 33 years. Had been married 3 1-2 or 4 years. His wife about 23 years old. Andrew was right handed. Cut wood and shot that way. He got there at 9 o'clock next morning and Andrew was living. I asked Mrs. Minnie Moore if she would help prosecute the case after I had employed Mr. Finch, and she answered she did not know. Then she employed Mr. Lucas to defend her.

Witness said the defendants were pretty thick. They were unusually attentive to each other. Moore would slip up to the house when Andrew was away. Another time I went to the house when Andrew was fishing and when I called at the door, their feet hit the floor and there was only one bed in the house mashed. He said Johnnie practically admitted intimacy with Mrs. Moore to witness. John

was going to shoot him, John ran out and threw pistol away after the shooting. Mrs. Moore told Sheriff that Andrew Moore got his gun, ran Johnnie in a corner and was about to shoot when Johnnie shot her husband in self-defense.

Sheriff said Moore gave himself up and came to Wilson without any hesitation.

Sadie Moore testified she went to spend the day with Mrs. Moore while Andrew and John came to town and both men returned about dark. That Mrs. Minnie Moore said that she was going to give Andrew hell, and when they came home she refused to turn Andrew in but turned John in and gave John supper but would not give any to Andrew.
