HERE AND THERE IN THE ATHLETIC WORLD

With Scholastic basketball at an end with the Roanoke Rapids-Golden Blue battle tomorrow night, the Wilson High School will now turn to baseball and track. Coach Bryan issued a call for candidates to report next Wednesday afternoon. He expects about forty men out for early Spring practice, and has for nucleus the following men: Robert Wilson High School will now turn to Geo. Wainwright, and Eldon Bent.

A meeting will be held tonight at New Bern in the interest of the Eastern Carolina Baseball League for the season of 1922. The towns to be represented are, New Bern, Goldsboro, Greenville, Tarboro, Washington, Farmville, and Kingston. The meeting is called by Mr. H. E. Barlow, ex-secretary of the Wilson Chamber of Commerce, now secretary of the New Bern Chamber of Commerce. According to Mr. Barlow the League is assured, and there will be at least six clubs entered.

Never was there played a more uncertain game of basketball than the one played Friday afternoon, in which the Buckhorn School quintet defeated the New Hope lads by the score of 4 to 3. Both teams played good ball, and made a classy showing for first year men.

Coach Bryan plans to enter the Golden Blue track stars in the Mammoth Indoor track meet, which will be held in Durham, March 10. This big athletic carnival is being held under the auspices of the University of North Carolina, Trinity College, and the Durham Y. M. C. A.

No more relentless search for baseball material among the students of high school was ever made than that which will be put over this spring at the Wilson High School. Convinced that the material which represented the Golden Blue last Spring was not the proper calibre to enable Wilson High to take its proper place in inter-scholastic baseball. A baseball league will be formed of youngsters from the following classes: Freshmen, Sophomore, Junior, Senior. Each team will have a game a week to play, the schedule to open the week of March 15. The team winning most games will be given a cup.

THE ATHLETIC OUTLOOK FOR THE HIGH SCHOOLS.

Raleigh, Feb. 27.—Such hamlets as Belhaven, and Benson are included in the five group winners for Athletic honors among the high schools already determined, while Fremont, Churchland and Kanapolis have reached the finals in their respective groups as has Reidsville, which is somewhere on the borderland between village and city. Asheville, Charlotte and Durham are the only larger towns in the State that have went out so far in their groups while Greensboro and Rocky Mount still have a chance.

As the situation now stands in the East, Belhaven, Benson and Durham are acknowledged winners while Fremont and Rocky Mount will probably play it out in the third group, although Fremont claimed the game by forfeiture when Rocky Mount failed to put in an appearance last Friday night at the scheduled game. In the West, Charlotte and Asheville have won in the first and third groups, while Greensboro and Reidsville will fight it out for second group honors at Guilford College tomorrow night and Churchland and Kanapolis will play at Erlanger tonight for the championship of the third group.

Churchland was good enough to beat Winston-Salem, but will probably meet an opponent of even strength in Kanapolis. Greensboro is another large town that seems due elimination before the race passes beyond the group stage as the Reidsville quint ran up 88 points on Thomsville and scored 50 against High Point.

Fremont also seems to have the edge on Rocky Mount, although given a hard fight by John Marshall of the State Normal, a team that lost to Raleigh.

eight, one of the teams eliminated in the first round of play.

All of the teams that have gone through the elimination by groups seem to be of an unusually high calibre and there is not sufficient basis for very accurate comparison of them. The Benson team has made an enviable record in the East, but Belhaven and Durham also have strong quintets. Asheville and Charlotte also seem to be unusually strong this season.

Charlotte, representative of the West in last year's championship game which was won by Chapel Hill, is the only one of the teams that figured largely last year which has come through this season. Leaksville, the team Charlotte last year defeated for Western honors, was eliminated in the first round and both Chapel Hill and New Bern, the other team to reach the finals in the East last year went out in the second round.

The teams are not only playing better basketball this season but are more numerous, there having been 59 entries as against 44 last year. The schedule for the semi-finals and finals in the East will be worked out at a conference to be held in Raleigh tomorrow night while similar arrangements for the West will be completed at Greensboro tomorrow night. The final game between the winners in the two sections will take place at Chapel Hill March 10 or 11.
