Democratic Proposition.

The Democrats who uphold and defend the Albany platform have been loud in their denunciation of Republicans, because they say that the 8th resolution means repudiation. They appeal to the law definition of equitable adjustment, and conclude that the term is the very embodiment of right. They have harped so long on this subject that they, no doubt, actually believe that no wrong is contained in the resolution, and that, if rightly construed, really means to pay the debt in full. Those persons who talk thus have certainly forgotten the first part of the resolution, that declares "that the amount of the bonded debt was increased more than two fold by the venal, illegal and unjustifiable terms of its contraction, is neither justice or wisdom," therefore must they resort to equitable adjustment.

The whole thing, taken together, can mean nothing else than that something must be lopped off, and if any sum is declared not due then there is repudiation; nothing else can be made out of it.

The orators of the Democratic party, Messrs. Grover and Slater, say pay in greenbacks the full face of the bonds. This they call equitable adjustment.

Now, when it is taken into consideration that the Government don't own but a few thousand dollars of greenbacks, it will be seen that the project of paying in greenbacks is impracticable. But the said orators say that the Government should print more greenbacks. But at this juncture a decision of the Supreme Court steps in and forbids the issuance of more greenbacks. Now the only alternative left is to pay the bonds at their face, in gold coin, or repudiate. These are the two horns of the dilemma, and our opponents may grasp which they please. Another specious argument, made by a candidate for office in this county, is to the effect that a part of the bonds were contracted in fraud, and that the

fraudulent part should actually be adjusted. To this a reply is made by Randall, Democratic member of Congress for Pennsylvania, in answer to Mungen's repudiation speech. That gentleman said:

"I agree with the gentleman from Ohio [Mr. Mungen] that the debt was negotiated at ruinous rates. That is a matter of just criticism against the party who then controlled the Government and made the negotiation. But as regards these who hold bonds upon which is stamped the faith and credit of the country, I say repudiation stands in no other light except the light of dishonesty."

I believe that in the interest of my country there should be no question about paying the entire principal of the public debt.

Now, gentlemen, which will you do, pay every dollar of the public debt in coin, or repudiate? There is no alternative.

CHAPTER I.

In presenting the biographical sketch of a noted individual in this county, we give, as the first chapter, the following from the Weekly Democratic Press of the 21st inst:

We have a few men in this county, formerly Democrats, who are engaged in the exportation business. J. O. Shelton, the go-between for your gentle Jasper, appears to be a kind of leader. What a comment on the God-and-morality party, when we see it engaged in such dirty-business as this. With an empty pocket and a broken heart, out of love, out of cash, he smoked the last drop of ten cents worth of whisky and left. After the passage of infamous Fifteenth Amendment, Shelton turned up again in pursuit of a wife. In his eye, the dusky maid of the forest became lovely and he looked upon B. T. Whitson to see what could be done in his behalf.

Whitson informed him that of that kind, he had hardly enough to supply local demands and referred him to La-follett. J. O.'s prospects are lovely and in consideration of his labors, in behalf of the glorious Union, soon after the Ides of June, he is to lead to Hymen's blushing altar one of the fairest of all the fair daughters, rolling in pleasure, lice and dirt, on the banks of the ever-murmuring Yamhill. He is the chosen vessel, a kind of swivel, on which to turn the Union of the races, in the bosom of domestic bliss. At present he is engaged by the Abolition party to do its dirty work, and illustrate the term "the Christianity and Spirit of the age." We will write no more on this point, as the upright and virtuous Gault promises to expose all rascals engaged in trying to defeat the wish of the people. All we have to say is, if Gault fails in exposing these rascals, Shelton, Matheny and others he is as bad if not worse than the meanest man in his party. Come, Gault, no crawl-fishing; give these fellows their due, expose them or your honesty is damned.

CHAPTER II.

No, we won't fail, nor crawl fish; but proceed at once to give a full history of a man who proved himself so political-dishonest as the subject of this biography, and especially as we have been able to learn more facts than were at the command of the writer above quoted.

In order to make it more correct and reliable, we must go back to 1864, when Shelton sold himself to the Democrats and exposed the Union League. Since then, that is to say, about a week ago, the Democrats bought him, and he is now very prominent in the canvass and is—except Mr. Hayden—the most talkative man for Democratic principles now in the county. Apart from his oratorical powers he has shown a remarkable fitness for making affidavits, exhibiting his own worthlessness and want of honor. More than that, he, by his sworn statement, gives it out that the Republicans can buy him again before election, if they desire so to do.

By the attention with which he is received and prominence given him, he is the most truthful man in the canvass.

CHAPTER III.

This chapter will be filled out by the Salem Press, when the subject of this sketch is bought by the Republicans.

The Association of Gentlemen (So-called) Have Lied Again.

In the Daily Press of the 23d, it is stated that the resolutions of the Union Republican Convention, at Dallas, declared in favor of a white man's government. This is another lying tale of the "gentlemen (so-called);" but we are not surprised, as this is in perfect consonance and keeping with their party proclivities. They also say that Congress and the Fifteenth Amendment declare in favor of universal suffrage. This is also false and in harmony with the habits of the so-called gentlemen. The truth is there is no inconsistency to be found in the platform of our party in this county, but the resolutions express the honest sentiments of our party. The first is simply the formal part, endorsing the State platform. This is done by all Covary Conventions in both parties, whether they endorse it in every particular or not. How is it about the 8th resolution? Who's lied about that? and who has acted the hypocrite?

The other three resolutions are the pet measures of the party in Polk county, and stand outside and do not clash with our State platform. The first declares in favor of economy in the administration of all our political affairs, the good old democratic doctrine. The second declares that we are opposed to so patching up our Constitution that the people of this State will be financially ruined by bankruptcy. What have you to say against that, you lying clan? And the third declares that, while we cheerfully acquiesce in the laws of the land, we are opposed to any further extension of the elective franchise to any save the white races. What is there here of which you so mournfully complain? Do you find fault with us because we do not declare ourselves outlaws as you did in 1861, or is it because we are opposed to any further extension of the ballot to any except white persons, the very principle you say is correct? Come out and explain, you sneaking falsifiers. The truth is, in this respect, we only speak our honest sentiments as a party. We were opposed to extending the ballot to other races of men at all, but the majority has decided against us, and like good and law-abiding citizens, we are willing to submit and obey the law, and now say—in our resolutions—like honest men that we are opposed to any further extension in that direction, and intend to fight it so long as the question is before the people and remains a debatable one; and what is more, we do not intend you shall outdo us in opposition to it, because, 1st, we think it wrong upon principle, and, 2d, are opposed to it as a matter of policy, for we know that when the thing is regulated three-fourths of all the Negroes, Indians, Chinamen, Malays and man-eaters will vote the Democratic ticket; upon the never-failing principle that

"birds of a feather will flock together."

And now, to dispose of your dirty sheet, and of the boldest exhibition of unwashed lies ever penned by things in human shape, we say to this "association of gentlemen (so-called)" that, while we must and are willing to submit to the law while it remains such upon our statute books, we have the proud consolation of knowing that this new fangled, repudiation, untrified, State supremacy Democracy must submit and take it too—together with every nullifier, secessionist and red-handed traitor in the land.
